First Fraternity Installed On Oregon Campusin 1900

Sigma Nu was installed Dec. 1, 1900. The first national sorority, Gamma Phi Beta, was installed Dec. 18, 1908.

These and the later organizations have had at least two different houses apiece through the years. Many rented large, old houses until a new home could be built.

Sigma Kappa has the newest and most modern house on campus. \$8.00; 1 light gray gabardine Among the buildings which have jacket, \$7.00; and 1 heavy Covart housed Greek organizations for the greatest number of years are the Kappa Sigma and Phi Gamma Delta houses.

> Several fraternities and sororities moved into new houses during the fall term of 1910. The Kappa Sigs' house at Alder street and 11th avenue east was being completed then. An Emerald story that year described it as a Swiss chalet with a rough finished and stained exterior. The Kappa Sigs are still living in the same house. They originally occupied what was the

> Lambda Rho on Campus Lambda Rho, a local sorority, had a new home late in 1910. The southern colonial house with twostory pillars in front and a sloping roof was located on Alder st. between 13th and 14th. On Oct. 13,

About 1932 that same house became Chi Psi lodge. The Chi Psi's were still there in 1934. By 1938 the Fiji's, who had been living in Sherry Ross hall due to the depression, were in their present house. That house is the same one pictured in the early Oreganas as the Lambda Rho house.

The present Pi Beta Phi house was shown in the old Oreganas as early as 1924 and in 1925 Delta rence, Colleen Moore, Gail Bow-Delta Delta, Alpha Tau Omega and Kappa Kappa Gamma were at the present addresses.

The most recent construction, the Sigma Kappa house, was begun in April 1949 and was sufficiently the first state university.






