Little to Attend AIA Conference

Sidney W. Little, dean of the school of architecture and allied arts, is scheduled to leave Friday on a seven-day trip to New Orleans and the final meeting of the American Institute of Architects' Survey Commission for the Education and Registration of Architects.

Members of the commission will go over the finished draft of the report which is the result of two years study of the education and registration problems of the profession.

Heads Education Section

Little is chairman of the education section of the commission. During the past two years, he has visited schools of architecture throughout the country to study their problems, preparatory to presenting them to the commission.

Items studied by his section of the commission include tuition fees and the number of years required to receive a professional degree in architecture, Little said.

\$800 Per Year Highest

Some of the information uncovered by the commission included that the highest tuition is \$800 per year. The average tuition for 55 schools of architecture is \$287, the average out-of-state tuition being \$375.

Forty-five of the fifty-five schools studied required five years for completion of architectural training. The remaining schools require six or more years for the first professional degree.

Student Court Mulls Inter-school Conference

Possibility of a conference of Pacific coast schools to discuss traffic problems, honor systems and other such problems was brought before the Student Court at its regular meeting Wednesday night.

The conference would be held on the Oregon campus sometime in February, Mike Adams, court chairman, said. Each school would be invited to send at least one student and one faculty member.

Adams also suggested that the conference should be under the sponsorship of the University's administration since the problems to be discussed are of interest to the faculty as well as the students.

The next meeting of the court is scheduled for Jan. 9.

Copies of New Fight Song to be Distributed

Michigan leads the world in production of motor vehicles.


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
