Pranksters Slated For Court Friday

Lino Nivolo, a University student fall term, and Gilles le Roux, 715 13th ave. E., are scheduled to appear in municipal court at 8:30 a.m. Friday to answer charges that they threw a homemade cardboard-covered bomb into the foyer of Arbuckle's shoe store New Year's eve.

The duo was booked with disorderly conduct and released on their own recognizance after admitting their participation in the incident.

They will enter pleas Friday before Judge John L. Barber Jr. Not guilty pleas will necessitate a trial, otherwise sentencing may be imposed at the hearing. Maximum penalty for disorderly conduct is 90 days in jail or a \$200 fine.

In the blast, an outside shoe display case was damaged, a glass front broken and a title base chipped. Police believed, however, that the object of the pair was noise rather than damage.

According to police, the homemade bomb was composed of an explosive powder poured into a cardboard container, wrapped in wax paper, taped and fused.

Nivolo is not enrolled in the University this term.

Job Opportunities

Examinations for the position of income tax auditor I, paying \$272 to \$336 a month, are now obtainable at offices of the State Tax commission.

The job involves auditing, reviewing and examining income tax returns of individuals, partnerships, estates and trusts to determine that all items of income have been included and that deductions claimed are allowable.

The examination consists of a written test covering accounting and auditing and the ability to conduct correspondence with the public. Veterans are given preference points.

Any person who has graduated from a four-year college or university including or supplemented by course work in accounting is eligible.

Job openings for graduating science majors as aquatic biologists with the Washington state department of fisheries are now available. Vacancies will be filled through merit examinations for Aquatic Biologist I, II and III. Opportunities exist for permanent appointments providing salary increases, vacation, sick leave, retirement and other benefits under the state merit system.

Beginning salaries are \$288, \$314 and \$358 a month at the I, II and III levels, respectively.

College graduates with a major in fisheries biology or a closely related science are eligible to apply for Aquatic Biologist I. One year of graduate study in fisheries or one year of experience in aquatic biology is also required for Aquatic Biologist II. One year of graduate study in fisheries and one year of experience or two years of experience are also required for Aquatic Biologist III.

Persons who will meet the requirements by June 1952 may apply for the initial examination to be held this month.

Application forms and further information may be secured from the State Personnel board, 1209 Smith tower, Seattle 4, Wash.

Examinations for filling cartographer and cartographic aid positions at salaries ranging from \$2,200 to \$7,600 a year, and for cartographic draftsman positions paying from \$2,200 to \$3,825 a year have been announced by the U.S. Civil Service commission.

The positions are located in Washington, D.C., and vicinity. A new field-service-at-large position will also be filled.

Applicants will not be required to take a written test but must have had from 3 months to 8 years (depending on the kind and grade of position) of appropriate experience.

Appropriate education may be substituted for all of the required experience for positions paying up to \$3,100, and for part of the experience required for the higher-level positions.

Lack of Support Will Keep Truman Out of Running

Ralph Hillier—senior in history—"It depends on the strength of the Eisenhower faction in the Republican party and whether Truman feels that Eisenhower's influence on foreign policy will have more weight than the Taft-Martin group, thus indicating a similar approach toward foreign outlook, or whether Truman feels for the benefit of the Democratic party, he must run as the party's strongest candidate."

Margie Davis—freshman in music—"I don't think he will because the Democrats want to win the election."

Donald Hamang—graduate student in psychology—"No, I think Kefauver will be nominated at the convention."

Conna Herr—freshman in art—"Yes, I think he will because he is the only logical Democrat to run."

Canadian Civic Planning Authority To Make Three Addresses Here

Leonard Marsh, professor of planning at University of British Columbia, will speak to students and faculty on subjects in the social science field this week, and will also be available for appointments.

Marsh, an expert on rural and urban land use, civic planning, and social welfare, will speak on "Problems of Teaching and Research in the Social Sciences" to faculty members and graduate students in his field at noon today in the faculty club.

"City Planning" is the topic of Marsh's address at a dinner given by local government officials and interested citizens at 6:30 p.m. tonight in the Student Union. He will address an open meeting at 9 a.m. Friday in 105 Commerce on "Differences in Approach to Problems of Social Welfare", contrasting the approaches of England, Canada and the United States.

Marsh will be available for appointments with interested students after 2:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday morning. Appointments may be made at the political science office in Susan Campbell hall (Ext. 273), according to that department.

Prior to joining the faculty at British Columbia, Marsh headed the institute for social research at McGill university in Montreal. He was also one of the principle authors of the Canadian Beveridge report on social welfare.
