

# Swimmers Meet Aeros In Opener Saturday

The University of Oregon swimming team, under the direction of Coach John Borchardt, opens its season at 2:30 p.m. Saturday against the Aero Club team of Portland, in a meet to be held at Eugene.

Coach Borchardt wishes to emphasize that the meet is open to the public, and that there is no admission charge.

The tentative Oregon entries for the meet, which is to be run with high school distances, are as follows:

The Aero Club team is composed of high school swimmers from the Portland area, and is coached by Ty Steinbeck. Outstanding for the visitors is Gil Westwell, national junior 150 meter individual medley champion. Also performing for the Aero natators will be Dan Cramer, 100 yard state free style champion.

The Oregon team will use the Saturday meet as a pre-season tuneup for the first Northern Division battle with OSC at Corvallis on Feb. 2. Other non-conference meets scheduled previous to the conference opener are with the Multnomah Club of Portland on January 19 at Eugene, and the State AAU meet on January 26 and 27.

ATO strong man was Ray Packwood who counted for 6 of his 14 winning points from the foul line, and Tom Mathews took advantage of numerous vacancies under the bucket to dump a total of 9 for the team. Jerry Ginzberg fired the Sammy half of the contest with 4 effective long shots and a final personal tally of 13.

Hal Toliver accounted for 7 much needed points that took a close contest out of the hands of the Beta Theta Pi five and home to Sigma Chi for an exciting windup, 24 to 20. The defeated Beta quintet boasted high man of the game with Harlan Miekey's 9 points.

## Huskies, Cougars Lead Statistics After Openers

LOS ANGELES—(U.P.)—The defending champion Washington Huskies lead the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball warriors in both team and individual scoring, league statistics revealed Thursday.

When Oregon State takes on the Huskies in a two-game series at Corvallis, Ore., this weekend, it will face the division's two top offensive threats in Bob Houbregs and Franks Guisness.

Houbregs has an average of 16 points per game in two conference starts, and Guisness ranks second with a 15-point-per-game average.

Washington also excelled in team marksmanship with a firing average of 32.5 per cent. The Huskies hit the hoops for 39 field goals in 120 attempts. Idaho was second with 36 hits in 121 tries for a 29.7 average.

### Huskies Lead Scoring

In total scoring, Washington again topped the division with 112 points, 56 digits per game. Washington State was second with 99 points in two games.

Tom Flynn of Idaho paced the division in field goals with eight two-pointers in 11 attempts. Mike McCutchen of Washington was second with eight out of 20.

Washington State ruled as the strongest defensive squad, followed by Washington and Oregon State.

Statistics lists California's John Rickson as the Southern Division's leading scorer. The Bear forward has scored 12 field goals and 14 free throws for 38 points. He compiled a 19 point per game average against Southern Cal last weekend.

### Ramstead Second

The remainder of the big five is as follows: Jim Ramstead, Stanford, 31; Ed Tucker, Stanford, 31; Bob Boyd, Southern Cal, 27; and Jerry Norman, UCLA, 26.

Tucker boasts the top free throw average in the division, .917 representing 11 out of 12. John Moore, UCLA, has a field goal average of .545. Moore has attempted 11 shots and netted six. Ramstead leads the rebounding parade with 20.

## Globe-Trotter Tickets

Tickets for the January 22 game between the Harlem Globetrotters and a selected team of ex-college stars will go on sale to students Monday. The price will be 60 cents upon presentation of an athletic card and about 3000 seats will be available for Oregon students, according to Athletic News Bureau director Art Litchman.
