Search for Missing Pennsylvania Crew Continues Despite Storm

The search for 45 crewmen of the American freighter Pennsylvania continued in the North Pacific Monday despite a new storm that is lashing the area.

"The search will continue indefinitely," the Coast Guard said. "Hope has not been given up."

Coast Guard officers said it was possible that the 45 crewmen who abandoned their sinking ship five days ago still are alive. But so far no trace has been found of the four lifeboats known to have been on the 7,800 ton freighter, and the weather has brought the search to a standstill for the past two days.

An increased air search is planned for today, because the Coast Guard coordinating center at Seattle says the weather promises to be the best since the Pennsylvania reported she was in trouble.

A plan for revenue collectors . . .

. . . taking them out of politics and placing them under civil service, was submitted to Congress Monday by President Truman.

Truman said the plan—which will become effective in 60 days unless rejected by either the House or Senate—will prevent improper conduct in public service and protect the government from insidious influence peddlers and favor seekers.

The President's plan would abolish the 64 collectors, who are now political appointees, and replace them with up to 25 district commissioners who would be under civil service.

The truce atmosphere is still poor . . .

. . . and the situation took a turn for the worse at Monday's session when Red delegates accused an Allied negotiator of taking part in deceit and what they termed a big lie.

That was in connection with the Allied proposal for a favorable prisoner exchange.

The U.N. negotiator, Rear Admiral R. E. Libby, snapped back in kind. He demanded the Reds prove their charge or retract their ill-considered remarks.

The separate subcommittees on truce supervision and prisoners of war were to meet again Monday night.

Universal military training is 'in' . . .

. . . according to members of the House armed services committee Monday. The committee will begin hearings on UMT today.

Members said the only real issue in the committee now is the precise kind of UMT program to be proposed.

In general, committee members expect to recommend to the House a law calling for induction of all able-bodied men at age of 18 into a new national security training corps for six months basic military training.

Afterwards the trainees would go into the reserves for 7½ years.

Vatican headquarters voiced satisfaction . . .

. . . Monday over president Truman's determination to send an ambassador to the Holy See despite withdrawal of Gen. Mark Clark's nomination.

They said Clark's withdrawal came as no surprise in view of the great controversy stirred up in the United States, but these sources indicated they hoped the president's new nominee would be a civilian diplomat rather than a military man.

Big Three Western powers proposed in Paris . . .

. . . Monday that Russia's surprise new formula for world atomic control be submitted to the new United Nations 12 power disarmament commission.

That commission, which includes representatives of the major powers, will meet sometime before Feb. 10.

The new Russian plan calls for a simultaneous ban on atomic weapons and institution of an international control system, and continuous, rather than period, inspections.

Jet fighters joined a search in Alaska . . .

. . . Monday to hunt for an Air Force C-47 missing on a training flight southeast of Fairbanks since Friday night with five men aboard.

Officers said they were "hopeful" the crew bailed out.

Search for the missing plane was pressed after the wreckage of a General Airlines plane was sighted smashed against a mountainside.

See-saw battle on the Korean front . . .

. . . only six miles from the truce conference site at Panmunjom was the only action reported Monday.

The Reds had held advance positions since Dec. 28, and the South Koreans managed to get them back Monday, but only momentarily. The Reds counter-attacked and regained the positions.

Bad weather limited air action.

President Truman talked politics . . .

. . . Monday, and his visitor, Senator Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.), said afterwards he is firmly convinced that Mr. Truman has not decided whether to seek re-election.

The president has said repeatedly that he knows what he is going to do in 1952. He said last week that he will disclose his decision in advance of the Republican national convention which starts July 7 at Chicago.

Humphrey said, however, that after talking with him Monday he feels certain that the chief executive "definitely is undecided."

British troops fought a three-hour battle . . .

. . . with Egyptian terrorists at Ismalia Sunday night and finally routed them with anti-tank guns.

There were no British casualties, but Egyptian ambulances were seen visiting buildings from which the terrorists fired on the British.

More than 30 paintings, the work of Israeli children, are now on display in the halls outside room 400 in the school of architecture and allied arts.
