Students to Enter 'Town Meeting'

Three Oregon students are participating in the fourth annual Northwest Inter-collegiate Town Meeting tournament in Portland today. The tournament opened Monday.

Students from 14 colleges and universities are discussing the question "What should be the terms of a peace that would end the 'cold war'?" in the Vanport college-sponsored contest.

Representing Oregon are Leland Johnson, senior in business; Don Collins, junior in economics; and Douglas Ambers, senior in political science. Johnson and Collins are speaking on panels. Ambers is acting as a moderator for the two-day meet.

Ben Padrow, graduate assistant in speech, accompanied the Oregon speakers.

Each student speaks four times during the two days. Winners will be determined by a selected vote in each group addressed. First, second and third place prizes will be awarded the best speakers.

The speakers are appearing before such organizations as Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions club, social studies classes of high schools and men at the Portland Veterans' hospitals.

Institutions taking part are: Clark college, Vancouver, Wash.; Concordia college, Lewis and Clark, Linfield, Marylhurst, Oregon State, Pacific university, Pacific Lutheran college, College of Puget Sound, Southern Oregon College of Education, University of Portland, Willamette, Vanport and Oregon.

Life Photo Exhibit On Display Jan. 26

"The Age of Enlightenment," a photographic exhibition prepared by the editors of Life magazine, will be on display in the current newspaper reading room of the library through Jan. 26.

The exhibition relates mainly to the work of scholars, artists and scientists who lived in France during the 18th century. The exhibition opened Monday.

Organized under three main sections (Versailles, Paris and the Age of Crisis), the exhibition will present a pictorial analysis of one of the great epochs in the history of western culture.

In the first section, Versailles and the Bourbon kings are the center of interest. The second section features Paris and the philosophers who made it the intellectual capital of the world. The third section reveals the rift between the people and the old regime. The exhibition closes with the coronation of Napoleon.
