World Disorder Due to Ignorance Says Foreign Student at Luncheon

"I think that the disaster in the world today is due merely to the ignorance that one country has of another country," Otto Zundritsch, special student in journalism, told the international affairs luncheon Wednesday.

Zundritsch, who is from Vienna, Austria, worked as a guide for the Austrian Student Travel bureau. He spoke on the topic "Student Travel, a Necessity for International Friendship."

Task of Youth Outlined

Zundritsch said that he believed that the task of youth is to accomplish international understanding. One way which this can be done is to meet people from other countries and becoming acquainted with their customs. Exchange students are a step in this direction, Zundritsch said.

American students seem to be interested in travelling in Europe, Zundritsch said, but Oregon does not have an organization on campus which will help students plan their trips and help students get special rates from travel bureaus in America and Europe.

No experience requirements and age limits are specified, but applicants will be required to pass a written test.
