

Register-Guard Editorial Stresses Scholarship Need

A need for more scholarships at the University of Oregon was stressed in an editorial that appeared in the Eugene Register-Guard Monday.

The editorial, written by William Tugman, editor of the paper, stated, "There is a great need for scholarships and financial aids for students who have demonstrated superior ability."

Mr. Tugman referred in his editorial to the recent endowment made by Julio W. Silva, Eugene businessman, to the University which will provide approximately \$150 a year and will be open to Lane county high school graduates. Tugman said he hoped the Silva scholarship would set a pattern.

The editorial quoted Lyle Nelson, director of public services, as saying, "We have exactly six scholarships worth the equivalent of tuition and fees (\$165) which are available to freshmen. This for an average freshman enrollment of between 1000 and 1200, is hardly adequate. The State Board provides some state fees scholarships in addition but these pay only about \$90 a year—hardly a drop in the bucket."

Oregon Expenses

The editorial went on to outline the average expenses of an Oregon student for a year and further said that approximately 75 per cent of all students are either totally or partially self-supporting. However, it is the exceptional student who can earn and save as much as \$1000 (the average cost per year) during the vacation period.

Ray Hawk, associate director of student affairs said that Tugman's editorial accomplished two things. 1. It pointed out the problem of the need for more scholarships. 2. It itemized the student's expenses in terms that the public could understand.

Attract Good Students

Hawk felt that more scholar-

ships would attract more people who would be good students. He said that "when you have a top executive you don't like to make a janitor out of him," and by the same token the University didn't like to see the people with brains driving log trucks and working in mills when they could be putting their minds to better advantage.

When people realize that giving endowments to universities is "an investment in human resources," Mr. Hawk said more such donations would be forthcoming. He also mentioned an editorial that recently appeared in the Portland Oregonian to the effect that charitable contributions should be given to educational institutions because such donations would be tax-exempt.

Hawk said that these are the people who are in the income bracket where taxes hurt and not the families with moderate incomes and two or three children who can afford to give.

The more scholarships made available the more chance the University will have of getting superior students, said Mrs. Golda Wickham, associate director of student affairs.

Mrs. Wickham said she is on the scholarship committee and it is a hard decision to make when there is perhaps one scholarship available and 50 applicants for it.

WRA Carnival Petitions Wanted
