

Husky Stars Hike Individual Honors

LOS ANGELES —(U.P.)— The University of Washington Huskies, defending Pacific Coast Conference basketball champs and one of the nation's top ranking quintets, dominated cage statistics released today for the league's Northern Division.

The Huskies, who meet Washington State college at Pullman in a two-game series this weekend, boast the division's leading scorer in Frank Guisness and the top marksman Duane Enochs.

Enochs hit the mark with 25 out of 51 floor shots in six games for a shooting mark of 49 per cent. Jim Padgett of Oregon State college held down the number two spot in that department with a 38.3 per cent average, followed by his teammate Bob Edwards with a 38.1 per cent.

Guisness averaged 14 points per game, sinking 25 field goals and 34 out of 44 free throw attempts for a total of 84 points.

Roberts' Second

Washington State's Eric Roberts was second in total scoring with 12.3 points per game, and Ken Hunt of the University of Oregon was third with 11.5.

Dan Johnston, who averaged 10.5 points per game, was the top marksman from the free throw line with 17 hits in 19 tries for an 89.5 per cent mark.

Herb Millard of the University of Idaho was second with 84 per cent, followed by Guisness with 77.3 per cent.

Washington also ranked in first 23.2 per cent average on its field. The Huskies led in total offense

with 57.5 points per game, while Oregon has the best rebound average, 18.3 per game, and allowed its foes the fewest points per game, 41.8. place in team shooting with a 38.1 per cent.

The fifth place time in the National Collegiate Swimming championship is 2:11.7 and Coach Borchardt believes that Edwards will be able to go below 2:10 flat. Edwards should be a very strong contender for national competition by the end of the season.

Competitors in the Senior Men's and Senior Women's State A.A.U. meet this Saturday will come from Oregon State, the Aero club, Multnomah Athletic club, the Vancouver Y.M.C.A. and several Portland Y.M.C.A. groups. The Duck team will receive a short workout Friday in their final preparation for the encounter.

Billiard Expert Here Next Week

Charles Peterson, world trick shot billiard champion, will appear at the Student Union for a five-day period, beginning Monday.

Students are asked to sign up at the recreation area now, for free instruction while Peterson is on the campus. While here, the billiard king will give instruction and present exhibitions each day.

Peterson, now 72 years old, devotes all his time to being a missionary for the game to the youth of America. Each year he visits many colleges, lecturing on billiards, giving lessons, and stimulating interest in the games as an intramural and intercollegiate sport.

The expert still finds time for his trick shot ability, developed in 55 years of study and practice, which is useful as "window dressing" for his serious instruction, and he still says, "Show me a shot I can't make."

Hundreds of shots, almost 700, many of them originated by himself, are in his bag of tricks.

Practice during the week has been hard, with a light drill held Thursday night to taper off and sharpen shooting eyes. Short ten-minute scrimmage sessions have predominated during the week, with emphasis on individual mistakes detected during the Husky tilts.

It was announced Thursday that Forward Keith Farnam and Guard Ron Bottler have been cut from the varsity squad for action with the jayvees. Possibilities are that Sophomore Forward Ron Phillips and Howard Page, a guard, will be brought up to the varsity.

Phillips is a six-foot, one-inch, ex-Roosevelt High ace and tallied 118 points in 16 games with the Ducklings last season. Page, six-foot, played under Borchers in 1951 at Marshfield High school, Coos Bay.
