that Tedro Croley, a member of the Student Union poster committee, made posters from SU poster material for Janet Wick, unsuccessful candidate for representative. The cost of the material was about \$2, Hampton said, and represented material which Miss Croley had purchased with her own funds and had not been reimbursed for. Hampton said that SU personnel had been notified of the incident.

Payment by Glass for materials used and assurance that the student body president would not use his name, office or available facilities for partisan political purposes again, were requested from the senate by Hampton.

Carey in answer said that Glass had paid for the materials. He said that he had allowed persons or groups outside the ASUO to use office facilities before (namely the Ditto-graph, duplicating machine) if they paid for materials used.

Glass Confessed

Glass brought the letter to him, Carey stated, and told him he intended to send it to Eugene freshmen. Glass intended to print duplicate copies to Eugene high school, Carey said, but he (Carey) offered the ASUO Ditto-graph. "I did not feel that I had committed any crime," Carey declared.

"I plead political naivety," Carey said. Previously Hampton had stated that any person who could conclude that the student body president could be politically naive was "a fool."

Not Supposed to Help

It was assumed that no political aid would be given through ASUO facilities during the election period, Hampton said, but no definite rules concerning it were announced.

Carey, who declared that there is a bond of fraternity which goes deeper than many other emotions, declared that he would have given the same type of aid he gave to Glass to other students if they had come to him.

He said that the ASUO secretary is paid \$25 a month and frequently has time to spare. She has done outside work in return for reimbursement for her time, materials and facilities, he stated.

Wednesday's freshman election saw about 60 per cent of freshman voting, Hampton stated. He expressed disappointment in the turnout because of the large number of polls open, the long voting time and the supposed high interest of the freshman class in the election.

Apostle Peter Praised By Catholic Speaker

Catholicism regards the apostle Peter as a cornerstone of the church, The Reverend Martin Thielen related in a round table discussion on "Founders of Christian Movements" Thursday morning.

He spoke to a large audience assembled both to listen and ask questions in the Dad's lounge. Superintendent of the Western Oregon Catholic schools, Father Thielen is an active member of many civic and educational groups.

A fisherman of Galilee, Simon Peter was called by Christ to be one of the 12 apostles, Father Thielen reiterated. He told how the apostle was chosen to carry on the church's work after Christ's crucifixion.

It was Peter who ultimately denied Christ three times in fear of a servant girl, yet it was also Peter to whom Christ said, "Upon this rock I shall build My church." Father Thielen proceeded to analyze the passage, in order to prove that the word "rock" referred only to Peter.

In that way, Peter became the first pope, Father Thielen said. Before people are willing to accept the apostle as the original pope, they must first understand the function of the papacy, he continued.

The popes are not thought of as "rivals" of Christ, the speaker explained.

plained. They are Christ's "vicars," his representatives on earth. Christ did not give any of his followers divine powers, according to Catholic dogma.

Jesus is the "invisible head of the church," and formulates its doctrines, Father Thielen stated. But when Christ said to Peter, "I will give to thee the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven," He meant that His apostle would be empowered to legislate, "to bind and loose," the speaker said.

Historical records show that Peter spent the last years of his life in Rome, Father Thielen pointed out. The apostle was crucified in the Circus of Nero, on the Vatican Hill, Rome, where in the time of Constantine a church was erected to his memory.

Because Christ established Peter as head of the church, Catholicism maintains that it was only logical for the papacy to be continued through succession. Early Christendom recognized that he who succeeded Peter as Bishop of Rome was the visible leader of the church, Father Thielen said.

While Christ is the founder of Catholicism, Peter, the missionary and worker of cures, is regarded as a highly strategic figure, it was emphasized.

In reply to a question from the audience about the place of tradition in Catholicism, Father Thielen said that the church's function is to develop Christ's teachings. The church is not free to change anything Christ has taught, he stated. However, it is necessary to clarify much dogma which has evolved since the church was established, he explained.
