

Northrop to Talk At Assembly Today

F.S.C. Northrop, professor of philosophy and law at Yale University, will speak on "East and West and Problems of World Law" at the 1 p.m. assembly today in the University theater.

At 4 p.m. students and faculty will have a chance to talk to Northrop at a coffee hour in 333-334 SU. The coffee hour is sponsored by the Student Union board and Mortar Board, senior women's honorary.

Northrop is a member of the board of directors for the School of Asiatic studies and is a member of the American Oriental society. He is one of the founders of the National Conference of Science, Philosophy and Religion and is also a member of the New York Philosophy club.

piclon of a violation to a member of the honor council, a governing group to be selected if the code goes into effect.

2. The detector personally confronts the violator with the fact that a suspected violation has occurred. The detector reminds the violator to report his offense to the honor council. The detector checks to make sure the offense is reported. If not, he reports it himself.

3. Suspected cheating cases detected by faculty members are reported in writing to the honor council, with recommendations of the professor as to the disposition of the case.

Honor pledges were also up for discussion. Suggested was printing a pledge on blue books for students to sign. However, details such as this will be left to a new honor committee to work out, as the sole purpose of this senate committee is to investigate the possibility of an honor code at Oregon and report its findings to the ASUO senate.

Institution Not Definite
The committee has no definite opinion, as yet, on how an honor code, should be applied throughout the entire school at once. Others think it might be made optional with professors. Other possible plans would be to use the code in just upper division subjects, or just in the college of liberal arts. An honor system is already in operation in the law school.

The University's neighbor school, Northwest Christian college, has an honor system in operation at the present time, so committee member Marilyn Thompson was asked to investigate and report on it at today's meeting.

Four members of the honor code committee met Monday afternoon with the student-faculty discipline committee for informal discussion over a wide range of possible problems concerning the honor system, J. M. Foskett, discipline committee chairman, said.

The meeting was not designed to reach any decisions or take action, Foskett, associate professor of sociology, explained, but to "broaden the thinking" of both groups.

Pre-meds Affected By Deferment Rules

First and second year pre-med students will no longer be eligible for contingent admission to medical school and therefore a deferment from the service, the University of Oregon medical school has announced.

Students granted contingent admission to the 1953 class last spring will be screened for performance this spring and those progressing satisfactorily will be continued on a contingent basis.

Because of the present methods of deferment through the selective service scholastic test, membership in ROTC and class standing, the method of provisional admission to the medical school was discontinued.
