Huskies to Arrive Today; Slate Drills

Rival coaches Bill Borchert of the University of Oregon and Tippy Dye of the University of Washington ordered a single dosage of light drills for their respective squads this afternoon at McArthur court, on the eve of the two-game Northern Division series here, Friday and Saturday nights. The Ducks will work out at 3:15 p.m. and then will turn over the hardwood to the unpredictable Seattlites. Bert Rose, Husky news bureau chief announced that the league leaders will fly into Eugene at 3:30 p.m.

Borchert: Webfoots 'Fair'

After supervising a two-hour drill Wednesday afternoon with the emphasis on over-coming both defensive and offensive Washington tactics, the Oregon coach said that his Webfoots looked "fair," but would have to sharpen considerably in order to be able to upset the visitors.

First on the day's agenda was a defensive drill employing Ken Hunt and Bob Hawes at the guards and Bob Peterson, Chet Noe and Kenny Wegner as the inner-defense. A team of ex-Oregon athletes, sometimes augmented by Hank Bonneman, portrayed the Huskies throughout the afternoon. Included were Ernie Baldini, Bob Hamilton, Jack McElvray, Paul Sowers and Brad Fullerton.

Borchert then installed Barney Holland and Bud Covey as the outer-defense, and deployed Keith Farnam, Mel Streeter and Jim Vranizan under the backboards. The Duck boss then reinstated the first-stringers and encouraged a pressing, close-checking defense.

JV's to Play Pair

Far more success was gained when Borchert switched the Ducks onto the attack as the Oregonians mastered the "Washington's" loose man-to-man defense and cashed in with accurate shooting and good coverage of the boards.

The full-court scrimmage fell somewhat short of the desired effect, being overrun with wild passing and sloppy defensive work.

Oregon's junior varsity quintet are slated to meet the Clark Junior College Penguins, of Vancouver, Wash. in Friday night's preliminary at 6:00. Don Kirsch's five will host Everybody's Drug store the following night.

University Business manager Howard Lemmons announced that general admission tickets for Friday's game will go on sale at 5:00 p.m. He also said that 750 tickets will be available to Oregon dads who are registered for this week-

end's activities in conjunction with "Dad's Day."

Ducks are at a premium and the ticket office estimates turnaway crowds of 8,500 for both nights.

Sigma Nu Wins

Sigma Alpha Mu made a startling recovery after being behind to Kappa Sigma at the end of the first quarter and rallied to beat their opponents 38 to 24. The trio of Terry Ginzburg, Al Barzman and Ron Abrams went wild in the scoring department, amassing 33 of the Sammies' 38 points. Ginzburg himself accounted for 14 tallies. For the losers Chuck Masfeldt played an all-around good game, especially on the backboards, while Don DeForest poured in nine counters.

At the same time in the adjacent court Phi Sigma Kappa bowed to a fast-breaking Sigma Nu team. Neither squad could hit the bucket in the first half as the 6-2 score indicated. In the last two cantos, play loosened up and the final score read 26 to 14.

Vince Tadei was high point man for the game with 11 points for the victors plus a good floor game.

In what may be considered a mild upset Pi Kappa Phi beat Sigma Chi 37 to 28. This "A" game, as were all of Wednesday's contests, saw Bob Bartholomew score 17 points and lead his mates to a decisive victory.

Lambda Chi Rolls

To say that the Lambda Chi-PIKA contest was high scoring would be a masterpiece of understatement but nevertheless the two clubs did ring up a sum total of 63 points in their game yesterday.
