

Idaho to Meet Webfoots Here This Weekend

In preparation for the invasion of Eugene this weekend by the Idaho Vandals, coached by Chuck Finley, the Oregon basketball squad ran through a brisk workout yesterday. The practice, which was relatively short, was nevertheless a full session of basketball. The Vandals of this year are rated as the best quint to come out of Moscow since the conference champions of 1946, and their 56-51 upset victory over Washington gives proof that they will be a tough team to beat. Oregon won three of the four tilts between the two squads last year, losing to the Vandals on the Idaho floor by a 66-63 count.

Kruger Leads Vandals

The Vandals scoring is led by Hartley Kruger, a 6-foot, 8-inch center, who is followed in the total points column by Dwight Morrison, a sophomore who stands just over 6-feet, 7-inches. This combination should prove tough to beat on the backboards, especially when they are backed up by a pair of guards who stand well over the 6-foot mark, as do sophomore Tom Flynn and Bruce McIntosh.

Pete Has Improved

Peterson Versatile As Prep Athlete

"He's a big strong son-of-a-gun, ain't he?" were the words of Washington State Basketball Coach Jack Friel, and that just about describes Bob Peterson, Oregon's ace backboard performer and point producer, at least when he's not on the bench.

Friel's words were spoken in grudging admiration, for the occasion was just after the second Oregon-Washington State game, in which Peterson had helped the Webfoots register a second straight 59-45 victory over the Cougars.

Although he did not lead the scoring that night, it is typical of Pete's reputation that the first concern of the WSC players was with his point total for the evening.

Last of "Three Bears"

Pete, a junior from Menlo Park, California, drapes his 210 pounds over a 6' 5" frame, which doesn't detract from his rough backboard play in the least. The husky PE major is the last of Oregon's noted "Three Bears" of last year's squad who guided the team to a second-spot finish, one game behind the

champion Washington Huskies.

While attending Sequoia High school in Redwood City, Pete gained many honors during his three years on the varsity. His team won the league title in 1948 and repeated in 1949. During those two seasons Pete made the All-League squad, won the Most Valuable Player award, and boasted a 16.2 points-per-game scoring average to lead in that department also.

Not confining his talents to the maple, Pete played football his senior year and proceeded to make the All-League team as an end. In baseball, Pete played first base and outfield, as well as taking his turn on the mound. He was chosen to the All-Star team his senior year in the diamond sport as well.

Set JC Record

After graduation Pete attended San Mateo JC for one year, where he was on the first-string varsity basketball squad. At San Mateo Pete established a school record by dumping in 531 points in 31 games, and also set a conference record of 221 points in 12 games, an 18.3 average.

For the Webfoots last year Pete racked up 226 counters in 19 contests, but has already broken that mark this year, having accounted for 240 markers to date, with 10 games yet to go on the schedule.

Incidentally, for those persons interested in the fate of the other members of the "Three Bears," one of them, burly Jim Loscutoff, is, according to Pete, performing for the Oakland Blue-and-Golds, while the other, Curt Barclay, is home in Missoula, Montana.
