Merv Englund kept the Frosh Counselors from getting swamped when he came out with a 512 series in the battle with the Fijis.

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JV's Clash Twice Over Weekend

Tonight the Oregon JV's pit their strength against the powerful OSC juniors, coached by Paul Valenti and Saturday night Mike Tichy will bring his Portland University JV's to town to do battle with the local quint. Both of these games will be preliminaries to the Oregon-Idaho series and will start at 6:00 p.m. each night.

The OSC starting line will probably include Bud Shritcliff and Cub Houck at the forwards, both varsity gridders who have considerable experience in the hoop spot; Bob Hendrickson at center, a sophomore from California who stands six-feet, eight-inches tall; Bobby Frantz and Johnny Jarboe at guards. Jarboe is a freshman who attended Grant in his prep days and last year was selected on the all-city squad.

With their added experience and height, the OSC juniors have beaten the Ducklings in two tries, 78-43 at Corvallis on January 19, and at McArthur Court two weeks ago 75-67.

The Portland JV's will probably have Jim Torson and Toby Lewis at the forward posts, Larry Krohn at center, and Bob Moore and Dick Bartell at guards. Moore, an ex-Grant player, was all-city two years ago as were Bartell and Torson. The last time these two squads met the Ducklings edged the Portlanders 53-49.

For Oregon coach Don Kirsch will start Ron Phillips and Howard Page at guards, Wayne Johnson at center, and Hugh Marner and Doug Rogers at forwards.

Phillips, a lanky sophomore from Portland leads the JV's in scoring with 117 points in 11 games for a 10.6 average per outing. Besides being a basketball player, Phillips is also a fine baseball prospect, and was one of the leading hitters on the frosh nine last year. Following Phillips in the scoring department is Page, who has potted 76 points in 11 tilts for a 7.1 average. Johnson, a newcomer to the squad, has a 7.00 average in 5 games.

Teams Grab IM Crowns

Three "A" division teams and one "B" division team grabbed championships, while a second grabbed a three way tie. The "A" division winners were Alpha Tau Omega, Phi Gamma Delta, and Nestor hall. The "B" division champ for league four is Phi Sigma Kappa. Nestor hall "Bs" beat Cherney 22 to 18 to make it a three way tie in another league. This tie between Nestor, Sederstrom and French will be played off tomorrow night and Saturday morning.

Alpha Tau Omega downed Phi Kappa Sigma to win their league championship. The final score was 27 to 20. ATO led at half time by a wide 16 to 6 margin, but Phi Kappa Sig soon chopped the lead down to three points.

Tom Mathews hit for nine, Ken Torgeson potted seven and Ron Lowell dumped five to lead the ATO scoring. Gene Beck scored nine and Bob Burge scored five to win high point honors for the losers.

Phi Gamma Delta edged Phi Delta Theta 15 to 13 to qualify for the final rounds of intramural play. The Fijis held a very narrow one point lead at half time. Stout was high for the Fijis and Nick Schmer was high for the Phi Deltas with seven each.

A high scoring crew from Sederstrom hall had their wings clipped by a fighting five from Nestor hall by a 32 to 19 count. Nestor had to overcome an early deficit to pull out a shaky 19-16 lead at half time. From that point on Pete Williams put the fire into the team that made Nestor look like a true champion.

Williams scored ten and Bill Haney scored eight for Nestor. Don Holt was high for Sederstrom with ten counters.

Phi Sigma Kappa trounced Delta Upsilon 20 to 13 to qualify for the championship rounds in the "B" division playoffs. Dick Blenkinsop scored twelve for the winners and Tyler scored seven for the losers.

Nestor hall beat Cherney 22 to 18 to make a three way tie in that "B" division league. It was a close game all of the way, but Nestor held a steam upper hand at all times. Hart and Morgan hit for six each for Nestor. Bob Hinman netted eight and Bob Christianson dumped six for the losers.

This win puts Nestor, Sederstrom and French into a three way tie, which will be played off today and Saturday. Each team finished with a 3-1 win-loss record.

Commenting on the coming series, Oregon Coach Bill Borchers stated:

"By virtue of their record and their personnel, Idaho rates as favorites, but we won't acknowledge that they are the better team. We hope our speed and enthusiasm will be able to compensate for their height and experience."

Borchers Seeks Improvement In Fans' Conduct

Coach Bill Borchers and the Oregon hoop squad today asked for the cooperation of the Oregon student body in improving the conduct of the basketball crowds at McArthur Court.

"We had several regrettable incidents last weekend during the Washington series which we would like to see eliminated in the future," the Oregon coach said.

"First, the practice of throwing empty cups and other material on the floor is hazardous to the players of both teams and we are sure that everyone realizes that an injury to a visiting player would create an impression which we would be a long time living down.

"We all realize that the fans are going to disagree with the judgment of the officials at times during the game. The officials we have assigned to our games are among the best on the Pacific Coast and know their job. We owe them the right to work without being bombarded by trash and personal abuse during the game.

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Look out-here comes a shortstop!

Each year many children are killed because they thoughtlessly follow bouncing balls into streets. So watch out for a bouncing ball—a young shortstop may be racing after it. Slow down near schools, playgrounds, and in residential areas.

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Slated to start for the invading Vandals are forwards Herb Millard and Stu Dollinger, center Hartley Kruger, and guards Sam Jenkins and Bruce McIntosh. Millard, a six-foot senior, has scored 51 points in ND play this year. Dollinger is another six-footer and is also a senior.

Kruger is the main scoring threat of the team, using his six-feet, seven and one-half inches effectively at center. He has accounted for 270 points for the first 24 games of the schedule, and has scored 87 points in Northern Division competition to lead the team with both totals.

Sam Jenkins is another senior who stands six-feet, three-inches tall. He took second team all-Northern Division honors last season, and is the floor leader and playmaker of the squad. His Northern Division scoring total is 33 points to date. Jenkins is also rated a standout defensively.

Paired with Jenkins at guards will be another tall hoopster, six-foot, four and one-half inch Bruce McIntosh, a junior. McIntosh is rated very highly and has scored 54 points in ND play this season.

Ready to inject even more height into the Vandal lineup will be centers Dwight Morrison and Ken Loudermilk, both six-feet, seven-inches tall, and forward Ed Haller, six-feet, six.

Vandal in Second Spot

The Vandals are currently in second place in the ND with six wins and two losses. The results of their current Willamette valley invasion of Oregon and OSC will largely determine whether they can catch the front-running Huskies, whom they meet Feb. 15 and 16 at Moscow.

Almost never do the Vandals sweep their Willamette valley four-games-in-five-nights series, and usually win two or less. Last year the Ducks took 60-56 and 62-56 decisions at Eugene, and split at Moscow, 63-66 and 47-46.

Streeter Regains Berth

The only two Webfoots who played prominent parts in last year's Idaho tilts are in Coach Bill Borchers' tentative starting lineup. They are Bob Peterson, forward, and Captain Ken Hunt, guard. Met Streeter has regained his starting forward berth, and will combine his backboard talents with Peterson and starting center

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
