Reporter Finds Little Agreement On Today's Query

"Do you prefer that instructors call you by your first or last name in class?" was the question asked by the inquiring reporter Thursday.

Four students said they wish to be called by their first name because it is more personal. Three said they like to be called by the last name because it makes them feel older, and because it is more courteous to older students.

Four students thought it depends upon the size of the class. If the class is small they prefer first names and if the class is large they thought teachers should use last names.

John Tonack—freshman in architecture—"By my first name. I think it's nicer in small classes, but instructors should use the last name in large classes."

Sally Hein—freshman in liberal arts—"I prefer my first name; I am more used to it."

Al Johnson—junior in pre-law—"It depends on the class. In small classes it is okay to use the first."

Roger Kuykendall—junior in English—"It's so very seldom they call me at all. I don't have much preference."

Al Martin—sophomore in journalism—"By the first name."

Paul Hales—freshman in liberal arts—"By the last name, because they're getting too friendly."

Barbara Williams—senior in speech—"It all depends on what class I'm in. Whatever they call everyone else is what I would like to be called by."

Bob Chambers—senior in speech—"By the first name, because the other way sounds older and I don't like people to remind me of my age."

Lois Kandra—senior in art—"By the first name, because it is more personal."

Norma Hamilton—freshman in liberal arts—"Since we're in college, I prefer the last. It's more formal, and since there are older people in some of the classes, the last name is better."

Jack Elliott—senior in foreign languages—"It doesn't make any difference. I would depend on the size of the class and degree of informality."

Margie Harris—freshman in education—"I like the last name, because it makes you feel older and, since some of the restrictions here make you feel like an adolescent, it's a pleasant change."

New Library Display Has Prize-winning Books

One hundred prize winning Scandinavian books are now on display in the University library's show-cases, and will remain there until the end of February.

These books were chosen because of their examples of printing, typography, binding, and illustrations. The books from Sweden, Norway, Denmark, and Finland are all in the language of the country where published.

These exceptional books were chosen from a yearly production of 15,000 and range in types from children's books to textbooks. Einar H. Bourman, director of the Sweden Shop in Los Angeles is loaning this collection to the library.

Author of 'All the King's Men' Tells Director How He Came to Write Play

Horace Robinson, director of the University theater production of "All the King's Men," has received a letter from the author, Robert Penn Warren, telling how he came to write the play.

The basic story of the novel "All the King's Men" was first used as the subject of a verse play called "Proud Flesh." Warren began work on "Proud Flesh" in the spring of 1938, worked on it that summer in Italy, and continued writing in Italy the next summer. He finished it the following winter in Rome.

Warren then laid the play aside and wrote his novel "At Heaven's Gate." After finishing that novel, Warren began to revise "Proud Flesh."

"By this time I had the general idea growing out of scale for a novel, and undertook the novel 'All the King's Men' in 1943," Warren wrote. He finished the novel in the summer of 1945 in New London, Connecticut, except for the last few pages, which were written in the library of the University of Minnesota.

In the winter of 1946-47 Eric Bentley read the manuscript of "Proud Flesh" and arranged for a production by the University theater at Minnesota.

Later in the summer of 1947 Warren wrote a prose play, very different in many respects and with a different theme, using the

material from the novel. This was first produced by Irwin Piscator at the President theater in New York, in January 1948.

Versions of the two plays have been given at the University of Illinois, Williams College, the University of Ohio, Yale school drama and other places.

"All the King's Men" will have its final production tonight, and will close for the Portland City theater presentation of "Come Back Little Sheba," which will play Saturday night at the University theater.
