International Relations Conference Will Draw Delegates from 40 High Schools

Delegates from 40 Oregon high schools will gather next weekend at the University for the fifth annual International Relations league conference to be held here Feb. 15-16.

Approximately 250 high school students representing international relations clubs will discuss American foreign policy at the meeting.

William C. Jones, dean of administration and acting president of the University, will open the conference Friday morning after which John Swarthout, head of the political science department at Oregon State college, will speak on "Major Factors of American Foreign Policy."

Swarthout Author of Guide

Professor Swarthout is co-author of the IRL study guide, an outline of American foreign policy prepared for the delegates as background material. Prof. Kline Swygard, also of Oregon State's political science department, is the other author.

The keynote address will be delivered by Warren E. Tomlinson of the College of Puget Sound, Tacoma, Wash. His topic will be "Refitting Germany into Europe."

Panel Discussion Scheduled

Following this will be a panel discussion. Speakers will be Swarthout, Tomlinson and the following staff members of the University of Oregon: Earl S. Pomeroy, associate professor of history; Charles T. Duncan, associate professor of journalism, and Charles P. Schleicher, professor of political science.

Joint sponsors of the conference are the Oregon Education association and the University of Oregon.

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she received from a person threatening to burn down a Eugene house which she has leased to the Negro family of Leon Gasper, unless the family moves. The family has not moved, and the reported threat has not been carried out.

The other incident was the report on what were termed scandalous living conditions for Negroes in Eugene, made by Edwin C. Berry, executive secretary of the Urban League of Portland, before the state fair employment practices committee meeting in Portland on Jan. 4. Berry said many Negroes have been forced to live in areas in Eugene which lack sanitary facilities, and many have to pay high rentals for shacks.

Geology Professor To Deliver Lecture To Science Group

J. C. Gair, assistant professor of geology since 1949, will deliver a Sigma Xi lecture Monday on "The Study of Rocks in Thin Sections". The lecture will be in the Student Union at 8 p.m.

Gair, who has specialized in rock structure, petrology and petrography, is a graduate of the University of Rochester where he received his baccalaureate degree in 1946.

Prior to receiving the doctorate he had worked in the geology department there as a student assistant. He spent two summers in field work in the Appalachians and was in western Europe in service during World War II. During the summer of 1949 he was on the faculty of the Mountain Lake Biological station at the University of Virginia. He is a member of Sigma Xi, national science honorary.

The Monday lecture, one of the annual Sigma Xi series, is open to the public.

also in on the proposal.

Kading said a "pool of fact" was being distributed to campus living organizations to provide the phone committee with additional information. It includes, he explained, such questions as: "How many business phones did your organization have? how many extensions?; when were pay phones installed?"

He said a letter or escrow—requesting P.T.&T. to hold money taken from pay phones on the campus pending settlement of the case—could not be sent until a formal complaint was made.

The PSPA report outlined the purposes of that group to the senate—to foster friendly relations among colleges and among the student body presidents and to serve as a "clearing house" for ideas. The cost of PSPA last year was \$288, which include \$80 dues.

"I feel that the University of Oregon cannot afford to miss the opportunity of maintaining membership," Carey stated. "The reports from PSPA are very effective for reference during the year."
