Student court members Mike Adams, chairman, and Fred Risser pointed out to the senate committee that the ASUO constitution gives jurisdiction in all disciplinary matters to that court. They wondered if this might not be in conand with the committee's suggested plan of an honor council and fieds.

> Article V Clause 3 of the constitution reads:

"The Court shall have jurisdiction in all disciplinary matters delegated to it by the President of the University or the ASUO Senate.'

At present, the student court handles only traffic violation cases.

Committee members emphasized that their suggested plan was not definite. They will discuss the student court-honor council relationship at their meeting next Tuesday.
