the possible inadvisability of having an open primary.

"It seems to me," said Dave Rodway, senior class president, "... just whoever got the most voters to go out (could) ... vote in the weakest candidate in (on the opposition slate)."

"... Wouldn't Have a Prayer" Rodway added: "If you (USA) ever got well organized ... we (AGS) wouldn't have a prayer."

It was stated by both Frye and Rodway that the convention system would only help one kind of minority representation while causing another kind. They explained that in the AGS delegate system, whereby delegates from houses select the party presidential candidate, the representatives know the preferences of their houses.

The USA plan states that delegates, taken from each of the eight schools on campus, would be pledged to support a candidate for the first vote only. If their candidate is not elected, then (the delegates) are free to vote for their own choice.

Primary Defense Summarized
Helen Jackson, senator-at-large, summed up the defense for the open primary, explaining that in a fraternity where 30 members supported one candidate and 10 another, both would have a voice.

"The (AGS) delegate supports the majority. This way the minority is able to say what it wants."

In other business, the senate accepted the recommendation of a joint senate-WSSF screening committee for co-chairmen of the Campus Vodvil, Joan Dysart, junior in English, and Rex Balentine, junior in liberal arts.

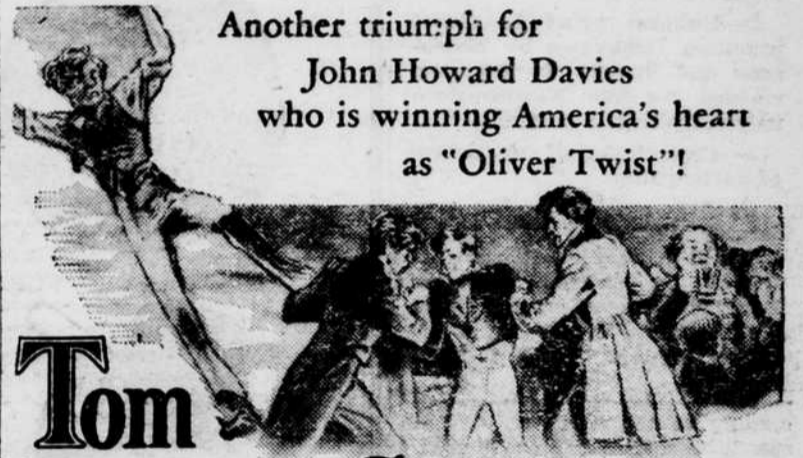

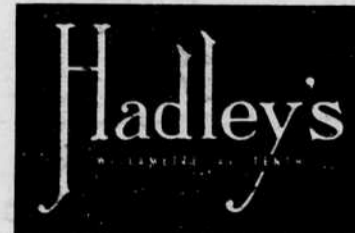
