Life Photographs of Egypt On Exhibit in Art Gallery

"Egypt," a photographic exhibition prepared by the editors of Life magazine, will be on display in the Little art gallery of the architecture school through Sunday.

"Egypt" contains the most recent photographs of remaining art monuments from an Egyptian culture that flourished for 3,000 years before Christ. The exhibition is based on the photographic essay, Art of Egypt, (Life, Jan. 19, 1948), although it is greatly enlarged in scope and includes much material not before published. The exhibition was assembled under the direction of W. C. Hayes of the department of Egyptology at the Metropolitan museum of Art.

"Egypt" includes some 50 photographs by Life Photographer Eliot Elisofon taken while on an assignment in the Nile valley. The subject matter is from the Old and New Kingdoms, and ranges from the simplicity of the Step Pyramid of King Djoser (2780-2761 B.C.) to the Great Temple of Hathor at Dendera, which was built during the first century B.C. under the Roman Emperor Augustus.

A series of three panels is devoted to several unusually fine reliefs uncovered in 1941, and not hitherto widely known: reliefs in the tomb of the Royal Scribe Kheruef in Western Thebes. Kheruef was a Steward of Queen Teye, principal

wife of Amun-hotpe 111 (1411-1374 B.C.)

The photographs are distinguished by their clarity and they convey a sense of scale often lacking in photographs of the colossi of ancient Egypt. Although most of the monuments are well known to scholars, perhaps they have not in recent times been so carefully and richly documented.

Included in "Egypt" are photographs of the Great Pyramid at Gizeh, a superb granite head of King Woserkaf, Queen Hatshesut's Mortuary Temple, reliefs of King Amun-hotpe 11. Temple of Amun at Karnak, the huge cliff-cut Temple of King Ramesses II at Abu Simbel, Temple of Rorus at Edfu, etc., in addition to many details of monuments and reliefs.

Opinions Favor Spring Pledging For Freshmen

Jean Clark—freshman in liberal arts—"Yes, I think deferred pledging is a good idea but don't know too much about it."

Clare Johnson—sophomore in liberal arts—"I think it's a good idea as there will be more unity between freshmen."

Mary Hansen—junior in pre-law—"It seems to me that the Holloway plan is sound because it will allow the entering freshmen a greater length of time in which to assess the respective merits of dormitories versus fraternities and allow him a better basis of judgment as to which house he would like to join."

Jim Miller—junior in architecture—"It's a good idea. I think it has merit in that it gives freshmen a chance to look over the houses and it also gives the houses a chance to see the freshmen too."

Barbara Evonchuck—junior in English—"I think it's a good idea as long as you have to live in the dorm anyway."

Virginia Johnson—freshman in liberal arts—"I don't think it's a very good idea—deferred living is enough without it."

Orville Overgen—junior in architecture—"They should be able to pledge any time they want to. After you get out of high school you should know what you want to do. Also, it gives you a chance to find out just what independent living is like—which isn't much at Oregon."

Dick Lewis—freshman in architecture—"No, I don't agree with the plan. I think they should pledge as soon as they have time to decide what they want."

Joyce Pinner—senior in psychology—"I think it would be better to have rushing in the spring, but I think that, at least in the case of the girls, it is best not to have deferred living at all."

Sue Madsen—sophomore in education—"I think a lot of kids will pledge who won't come back. I think there should be deferred pledging, but it should be the first of the sophomore year."
