Karl Kamrath, Noted Architect, Visiting Campus

Karl Kamrath, Houston, Texas, architect currently visiting the University of Oregon school of architecture is very favorably impressed with the University's architecture school, according to H. R. Sebold, assistant professor of architecture.

He likes the way architecture is taught at Oregon—the non-competitive, no-grade system—and he feels that the Oregon idea of preserving the individual quality of architecture has many advantages over the methods used in other schools, Sebold said.

A collection of sketches, plans and photographs of Kamrath's work is currently on display on the second floor gallery of the architecture school. Kamrath recently designed the \$8,000,000 M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research in Houston, Tex. Photographs showing the progress of the hospital's construction will be published this month in the magazine "Architectural Forum," Sebold said.

This week, Kamrath was scheduled to give drafting room criticism to second, third, fourth and fifth year students and be present at terminal project reviews, Sebold stated. Kamrath was recently a visiting critic at the University of Illinois, the University of Texas and the University of Houston.

At Milton-Freewater Y delegates can attend the Oregon migrant service seminar June 14 to July 31. Purpose of the seminar is to serve migrant labor by helping to provide recreation, crafts, playgrounds and Bible schools.

Students will work in canneries with the laborer for half a day, six days a week, at approximately a dollar an hour. In this way the students study the workers, and at the same time help them apply new standards of living in their work and play.

A registration fee of \$20 is charged for the Milton-Freewater seminar, board and room is free. Students are housed in separate housing units.

A West coast leadership training school will be held June 26 to August 11 at the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, Calif., for presidents and cabinet members of the YW and YM.

The leadership training school has three objectives—introduction to the Christian faith, introduction to social ethics and leadership in the Student Christian association. Six semester hours of credit are received for these courses.

Revised SU Budget Gives Expenditures

The budget provides a \$500 item for travel. It will enable two delegates from the SU board to attend the convention of the National Association of College Unions held this year at Oklahoma A & M college, Stillwater, Okla.

Remaining budget expenses go to defray equipment, supplies, telephone and telegraph and miscellaneous expenses. The latter includes an appropriation for coffee hours for visiting lecturers.

No Pay for Members

All board members serve without compensation. The only item for wages is \$200 for the services of a student secretary in the office of Program Director Olga Yevtich.

"This year's budget should end up in balance unless we take a big loss on something," Board Chairman Hillier said. Income and expenses are running as expected except for the feature movie program.

"It seems we have good movies during good weather and attendance falls behind, he said. "We may have to make some changes in our spring term program. We can't compete with the Sunday picnics." The budget provides a \$330 reserve for contingency to absorb revenue losses or unusual expenses.

Little Comparison Basis

There is little basis for comparing this year's budget with last year's, Hillier pointed out. Special attractions were included in last year's program which did not start until winter term. He noted that a good portion of last year's revenue went to purchase equipment and trophies. "This year we will be able to spend more directly toward the support of board activities," he said.

Already planned for next year are two new phases to activity, a record lending library and a student-forum series. A room will be set aside for the issuance of records to individuals or groups. The records for the library have been ordered. The student-forum series will present speakers on controversial and timely issues with an audience participation session to follow.
