

Oregon Swimming Team Faces ND Champion Husky Mermen

Wednesday's swimming practice sessions were concerned mainly with time trials under a meet pattern as the Duck swimmers prepared for the impending Washington meet. The Huskies will vie with Oregon Friday at 3:30 in the men's pool.

The Ducks now have a 2-1 conference record but are given tough odds against the defending champion Huskies. Coach Borchardt indicates a possibility of winning six events but says they will be close and could go either way.

Without a doubt the fans will see some of the year's best swimming with a total of nine Northern Division records in jeopardy. Gordon Edwards will threaten the 220-yard freestyle mark. Both Edwards and Bob Clayton of Washington will be out to crack the

440 freestyle standard.

Other events whose records will go on the block are the 200-yard backstroke by Yosh Terada or Bob Hamblin of Washington, the 180-individual medley by Terada or Pete Salmon of Washington, the 60-yard freestyle by Milton Kotoshiroda or Dick Elliott of Washington, the 200 breaststroke by Allan Wakinekona or Dick Magnuson of Washington, and both the 300-yard medley and 400-yard freestyle relays by Washington. Also the best diving in the Northern division will be seen as Oregon's Pete Charlton goes against All-American Merrill Hodges of Washington.

Oregon ranks 9th among the states in size, but only 23rd in population.

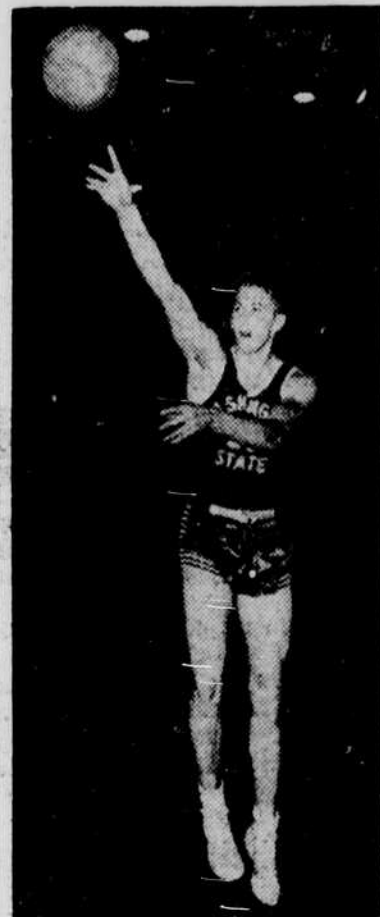
Order of O to Meet

Oregon Squad Drills For Empire Jaunt

Five grueling scrimmages were the bill of the day, as Coach Bill Borchardt continued to get his Duck basketball squad in shape for the Inland Empire marathon this weekend. Oregon faces Washington State at Pullman in the Friday and Saturday night games, then jumps to Moscow, Idaho, where they meet Chuck Finley's Vandals on Monday and Tuesday.

Fresh from their conquest of Oregon State last weekend, the Webfoots are confronted by the toughest five days of the Northern Division season. If they can win two of the coming four tilts, the trip will be considered successful.

On this same jaunt last year, the Ducks came within two points of sweeping the four-game series. They won three of the contests, losing only to Idaho by a 46-47 count.

At the present time, Oregon is in third place in the ND race, occupying a position only one game behind the second-place Idaho cagers. They are just one game ahead of Washington State, and anything worse than a split in the Cougar series would drop the Ducks into fourth place in the conference.

Borchardt Works Squad Hard

In Tuesday's drill, Borchardt devoted the entire practice time to scrimmaging. Both squads were trying to get the jump on each other by fast-breaking, with Borchardt constantly making minor corrections on the break and on defensive play.

Ken Hunt and Bob Peterson were particularly outstanding, both were connecting on shots from well out, and one or the other was always leading his teammates down the court on the fast break.

As the scrimmage session continued, the passing and ball-handling became more and more careless, for the strain of the hard-fought ten-minute periods began to take effect on the players. There was much unnecessary fouling on the part of both teams.

Junior forward Keith Farnam looked very good on defense, and he also made a number of very nice shots from keyhole distance. His tipping was also very good.

Fatigue Dampens Spirit

On the whole, the shooting during the scrimmages was as good as could be expected, but several poor shots were taken by both teams.

Team performance and screening was mechanically good, but there was very little spirit on either of the quints. However, the speed of the play had taken the fire out of most of the varsity hoopsters by the time that the fourth and fifth scrimmages were played.

Especially impressive was the hustle displayed by Peterson and Hunt, who were the only team members who worked as hard as possible all throughout the session. Freshman Ron Bottler also showed considerable spirit.

Noe Leads Scoring

In the team statistics released, Chet Noe leads the Oregon scoring column with 291 points, for a 12.1 points-per-game average. He is closely followed by Bob Peterson and Ken Hunt, who have 289 and 264 respectively.

Peterson now has 155 rebounds and needs only 28 more to tie his conference mark of 183, set last season, while Hunt now has 37 assists to lead the league and appears likely to establish a new conference record in this department.

Capt. Hunt and Bob Hawes are tied for the free throw percentage leadership at .759, and Hunt leads in the number scored with 41. As a team, the Ducks are hitting .679 in this department and if they continue at their present rate they will set another new Oregon record.

Webfoot Slatmen To Enter Reno Winter Carnival

Coach Gene Harlow's University of Oregon ski team is set for competition in the Reno Winter Carnival at Mt. Rose, Nevada, Saturday and Sunday.

Last weekend the Duck slatmen finished fourth in the Northern Division invitational ski meet at Emiba, Idaho, and Pullman, Washington.

Harlow pointed out that Jan Onsrud, Oregon cross-country man, turned in an outstanding performance when he finished second in the cross-country event. Competing against him were three members of the American Olympic ski team from WSC, and also the 1951 national champion from Montana State college.

Harlow says that he considers Washington State college to have the best ski team in the nation, and that the Washington Huskies press them closely.

Another outstanding performance in the ND meet was turned in by Stu McCollum in the giant slalom event. He finished fifth, which Harlow considers "good in that kind of competition."

Last year, the Oregon ski team, under the direction of Bob "Butter" McClure, football line coach, and Leo Harris, athletic director, placed fifth out of a seven-team field in the Reno event.

Another feature of the carnival is the crowning of a "Snow Queen", and Oregon candidate Nancy Miller was chosen for the honor in 1951. Harlow said he did not know whether or not anything had been done toward selecting a candidate for this season.

SU Will Feature Bowling Movies
