Students Believe Teachers Should Engage in Politics

"Do you think teachers should engage in politics?" Most of the students asked this question believed that teachers had a right to go into politics if they wished.

Two students felt that they shouldn't because they might unduly influence those they taught.

Bill Blain—freshman in architecture—"No, it might influence the students."

Bob Hazelett—senior in social science—"Yes, teachers have as much a right as anyone else to participate in politics."

Yuergen Behnke—graduate in journalism—"Certainly, because they can't educate students without having their own opinions."

Barbara Kurilo—sophomore in liberal arts—"Yes, I think so because they should have the same rights and privileges anyone else has. However, they might sway some votes."

Dirk Schepers—senior in math—"Yes, naturally. They are supposed to be the intelligent ones, aren't they? So, they should participate. It would be a waste of intellect."

Jim Piske—freshman in pre-med—"I think in view of the fact that they are in public service, they should refrain from actively participating in politics... in school, at least."

Marc Delemme—special student in political science—"Yes, they should be allowed to because they all are free citizens. They should only run if they know anything about government."

Elizabeth Collins—freshman in liberal arts—"Senator Morse did it, and he's doing a fairly successful job. If he is an example, it would be a good idea."

Tom Brand—second year law—"Sure, they have the same right as anyone else. They should be careful of undue influencing. It is their duty since presumably, they represent the enlightened minority."

Susan Berg—freshman in education—"Yes, I think they have as much right as anyone else. I don't think their profession should deprive them of civic office."

There are a number of new calls for employment throughout the state, Karl W. Onthank, scholarship chairman, states.

There is a call for a recreational director at the state penitentiary, a chemist for a food concern in Eastern Oregon, and trainees for Reynolds Metal company in accounting, psychology and various other fields.
