

JV's to Face IM All-Stars In Last Game of Season

Next weekend the JV basketball team will play its last game of the season when it tangles with the intramural all-star team as a preliminary to the opener of the second Oregon-OSC series. The tilt will be played Friday and will start at 6:00 p.m. in McArthur court.

Leading the JV's in scoring is Don Phillips, a sophomore, who has potted 167 points in 16 games for a 10.4 average per game. Phillips hit his peak several weeks ago when he netted 25 points for a losing cause against OSC.

Howard Page is next in scoring with 125 points in 16 games for a 7.8 average per outing. Don Siegmund, who is also a hurler in baseball, has garnered 98 points in 16 games. Last season while a freshman, Siegmund led the Frosh hitters with a 410 average besides winning several games while on the hill.

During the entire season the JV's have scored a total of 1006 points

in 18 games for a 55.9 per game average while their opponents have scored 1036 for a 57.5 average.

Coach Don Kirsch suspended practice last week because the juniors had no scheduled contest.

The IM all-stars will provide tough competition for the Ducklings Friday night, as the squad consists of several athletes who compete on local AAU squads, as well as ex-Oregon frosh and varsity performers.

Everett Peery, intramural director, has begun workouts for the all-star squad, and will act as their coach for the game, assisted by Ray Coley, assistant intramural director.

Providing backboard strength for the all-stars will be Dick Stoutt, Phi Gamma Delta; Ken Torgerson and Tom Matthews, Alpha Tau Omega; Dick Kofford, Nestor; and Don Hull, Delta Tau Delta.

Webfoots Gain Split at Pullman; Idaho Series to Start Tonight

Ducks Down WSC In First Game 71-61, As Hunt Scores 17

The Oregon Ducks administered a sound defeat to the Washington State Cougars Friday night in Pullman by a score of 71-61. After a slow start the Borchers boys picked up steam in the second quarter and left the floor at half time with 37-33 bulge.

The attack slowed down in the third but the fourth saw Kenny Wegner go wild with a 10 point barrage in less than three minutes to give the Webfoots a healthy ten point margin which they held on to throughout the remainder of the game.

The first quarter scoring was on even terms with Oregon blowing an early 5-1 lead to lag by a 13-14 score going into the second canto. Bob Peterson and Ken Hunt carried the brunt of the scoring in this period which was a seesaw affair up to the closing minutes of the half. Then a field goal and a charity toss by Captain Hunt put the score at 30-29 and gave the locals a lead which they never relinquished.

Oregon battled to a six point margin at the end of the third as Chet Noe began finding the range. Kenny Wegner's aforementioned point splurge at the beginning of the fourth stanza sunk the game Cougars for good as they were unable to overcome Oregon's magic margin of ten points.

Webfoots Accurate

It was the Webfoot's overall team accuracy that spelled doom for the Cougars. Oregon's percentage was 39 per cent as compared to 30 per cent for Washington State. Four of the greenclads scored in the teens—Wegner, Bob Peterson, Ken Hunt, and Chet Noe. Hunt took high point honors for the contest with 17.

Rugged Don Steinbrunner played a fine game as alternate for Rosser in the post position and scored 11 points to lead his team in this department. Despite his comparative shortness for a center, six-foot, two-inches, the all-coast football end gave Peterson and Noe plenty of competition under the boards.

The win gave Oregon a shaky third place spot in the Northern Division standings.

UO Skiers Third In Reno Carnival

RENO, Nev., (U.P.) — The University of Denver ski team, led by brilliantly versatile Marvin Crawford, won the slalom and jumping competition Sunday to sweep all major silver dollar derby events in the three-day University of Nevada Winter Carnival.

A crowd of more than 3,000 jammed the Mount Rose ski slopes beneath sunny skies to watch Crawford add both the slalom and jumping trophies to his victory in the cross-country race on Friday.

The Denver flash made his two slalom runs in the combined time of 1:37.7 and then set a new hill record in the jumping event at 151 feet.

Ducks Third

Crawford's sparkling performance gave Denver a grand total of 400 points for the meet for an easy team victory. The University of Utah was second with 374.86, followed by Oregon, 357.39; Nevada 351.25; Stanford, 348.35; Portland university, 332.37; California, 319.75; UCLA, 319.19; College of Pacific, 269.46, and Modesto junior college, 213.05.

WSC Wins 67-65, As Mullins Sinks Last-minute Shot

Oregon's chances of taking second place in the Northern Division basketball merry-go-round received an abrupt set-back Saturday night, as they blew an 11 point margin in the fourth period to drop their game with the Cougars of WSC by a 67-65 count.

It looked as if the Ducks had the game in the bag with eight minutes to play, as they were sporting a 61-50 lead. The battling Cougars refused to admit defeat, however, and Guard Scott Foxley split the hoop with two long shots to put the home squad within range of the Webfoots.

Ducks Stall

With a little more than a minute left in the contest, Oregon led 65-63, and Coach Bill Borchers' boys went into a stall. With about 20 seconds remaining to play, Bob Swanson stole the ball and passed it to Foxley. Foxley raced down the court, laid the ball up and missed.

Pete Mullins, 6-foot, 4-inch basketball - playing high - jumper from Australia had followed the play down the floor, and he was right there to meet the rebound as it came off the rim and tip it up to tie the score. Just before the final gun, the alert forward tipped in another rebound to put the Cougars ahead for good, and to give them a split in the series.

With the two Kents, Hunt and Wegner, leading the way, the Webfoots took command of the game in the first half, rolling to a 45-30 lead at intermission time, and it looked like a runaway for the visitors.

Captain Ken Hunt was largely responsible for the wide margin held by the Ducks at halftime, for he had poured 17 points through the hoop in the first two stanzas.

WSC Spurs

Washington State gave an indication of the later drive to be put on in the third quarter, when they scored nine consecutive points to close the margin to 45-39. They could not keep up the pace at this point, however, and due largely to the efforts of Oregon's Ken Wegner, they dropped behind to an 11 point deficit as the third canto ended.

They caught fire again in the last period, and steadily closed the gap, with Mullins sinking the final two points to climax the drive.

The Ducks will meet Coach Finley's Idaho Vandals tonight at Moscow in the third game of their five day grind. Undoubtedly Finley scouted the Webfoots in their two games with WSC, and he will be well prepared for the much-traveled Webfoots this evening.

In their two previous games this season, the Vandals and Oregon each won one of the tilts, so no conclusions can be drawn from the results. It is seldom that either Washington State or Idaho is beaten twice by other ND hoop squads on the Inland Empire tour, but it is not impossible.

Oregon Chances

If Coach Borchers and his boys should take both games from Idaho, they would be in a second-place tie with the Vandals. It is unlikely that this will be the case, however, for the strain of the trip, combined with the extreme partisanship of the fans at Idaho will present a mental hazard for the Ducks, which will be hard to overcome.

If the series ends in a split, as is likely, the standings of the teams would not be changed. Oregon would still be in third place, one game ahead of Washington State and the same distance behind the Vandals.

If the Ducks should drop both contests to the Vandals, they would still be in the third place in the conference standings, but
