Farnam Is 'Fireman' For Webfoot Cagers

A tremendous improvement over his performance of last season has boosted Keith Farnam, an elusive junior from Salem, into the role of one of the top firemen on Coach Bill Borchers' Oregon basketball team. As a matter of fact, Farnam has moved up to the extent that he has gained a starting berth on several occasions.

Borchers pointed out that, although Farnam's defensive strength has progressed rapidly, his most noticeable advance has been on the scoring side of the game.

Has Good Shot

A left-hander, Keith has an almost uncheckable unorthodox shot which he releases while driving

across the key, and also does much scoring with a deadly one-hand pusher.

While attending Salem High school, the 6' 2" PE major helped his team to gain the state tournament during his junior and senior years. In 1948 Salem advanced to the finals only to lose out to Corvallis. That year Keith was selected to a berth on the second-string All-State squad.

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Sigma Chi Defeats ATO, Hits IM Finals

The first semi-final meet in this year's intramural track championships was held Tuesday afternoon, and a strong Sigma Chi outfit subdued an almost equally strong Alpha Tau Omega aggregation, 34½ to 33½.

Throughout the entire meet the difference in scores never fluctuated more than six points, a fact that alone shows the teams' comparative equality.

Before the Relay event the score stood at 26½ for Sigma Chi to 27½ for Alpha Tau Omega. Then the Sigs' four relay men dashed off to a new IM record in the 160 yard event. There was only one catch—they were disqualified for jumping the gun.

That made the score read 32½ for the ATO's to the Sigma Chi's 26½. In order to cop the match they would have to take both first and second place in the next and last event, the three-quarter mile run.

Garret Breaks Record

The race started with Jerry Garret of the Sigs setting a fast pace. He was followed in turn by ATO Monte Brethauer and Sigma Chi Merlyn Samples. For the first two and a quarter laps these boys held their respective positions, but then Samples, a Springfield pledge, began to pull up on the tiring Brethauer, and caught him on the far turn.

From then on it was a neck and neck affair with the Sigma Chi finally pulling ahead to cross the line some five feet in front of the third place Brethauer. Garret, the winner set a new record for the event at 3:13.3.

WSC Hires Roger Grove to Mentor Football Backfield

PULLMAN, Wash. (U.P.)—Roger Grove, 44, former Michigan State College and Green Bay Packer backfield star, was hired today to coach Washington State College's grid backfield.

Dean Golden Romeny of the department of Physical Education said Grove would arrive on the campus before spring practice April 14. The appointment is effective April 1.

Grove, a former MSC running mate of Al Kircher, WSC's head football coach, has spent the last four years as an Alton, Ill., high school mentor.

Grove earned three varsity letters for the Spartans and then quarterbacked the Green Bay Packers after graduation to a professional championship in 1931.

He played with the Packers for five years before coaching professionally until he went in the army.

Grove succeeds Bob Flora, who left WSC with Coach Forest Evashevski for a coaching berth at Iowa. WSC still needs an end coach to round out its new football coaching staff.

Vandals Reverse Webfoots' Score Of Evening Before

University of Idaho's dogged Vandals reversed Monday night's 66-60 defeat at the hands of the University of Oregon in Memorial Gymnasium, Moscow, Ida. Tuesday evening with an identical, 66-60 victory over the Ducks.

The Vandals thereby clinched at least a tie for second place in the final Northern Division PCC standings with a win-loss record of 9-7. Oregon, with a pair of games remaining to be played with Oregon State college Friday and Saturday nights, must win both games in order to deadlock the loop's runner-up berth. The Ducks have a 7-7 record.

Morrison Tallies

Six-foot, eight-inch Forward Dwight Morrison was the Webfoots' number one nemesis. Morrison, who able to score but six points in the first half, exploded in the final 20 minutes of action for 13 tallies. Morrison shattered a 54-54 deadlock four minutes before the final horn to give the Idahoans the lead, and for all practical purposes, the game and second place, at least temporarily.

Kenny Hunt, senior Duck captain from Coos Bay, continued his blistering pace by racking up 17 more points and boosting his Palouse hills series total to 74 tallies. Center Chet Noe tied Morrison for high honors by registering 19 times.

The fatigued Ducks started slowly and finished slowly, but scored 40 points in the middle periods. The Webfoots were able to score only eight times in the first quarter and contacted the hoop on but 12 occasions in the closing canto.

Idaho Leads Early

Idaho jumped into the lead at the outset of the game and maintained it until three minutes and thirty seconds of the third quarter had elapsed. Ken Wegner drove around the post and threw up a left-handed hook which pulled Oregon into a 36-36 standoff and Mel Streeter followed immediately with a jump shot.

The score was even at 38-38 when Bob White added a free toss, but Hunt retaliated with a 30-foot cast and Noe canned a soft, southpaw hook. Coach Bill Borchers' charges managed to stay in front throughout the duration of the third stanza, commanding a 48-44 edge at that juncture.

Morrison auspiciously opened the finale with another popular left-handed twister and Stu Dollinger and two teammates ganged up on Wegner and scored an easy three on one lay-up. Wegner fouled Dollinger and the latter added the extra marker to tie the count again, 49-49.

Noe committed a violation and Bruce McIntosh handed the Vandals another lead which Hunt erased with a one-handed jump effort. McIntosh promptly tied it and Morrison untied it with a lay up which wound up a fast break. Peterson and Dollinger exchanged free throws, but Noe out-reached Ed (Mohawk) Haller, and fed off to Hunt who tossed back to Noe. Noe missed his shot but the same Haller got his arms tangled.

Fans Aroused

Noe, shooting into the teeth of 4,000 riotous Idaho partisans, tanked both tosses at the 4:05 mark to tie the count for the last time, 54-54. Then the vandalous Morrison flipped a radar-guided shot from the foul line which was the telling blow.

Hunt was able to bring the Ducks up to 56-57, but a pair of swift and simple out-of-bounds plays plus the Vandals top notch keep-away game was more than the travel-weary Ducks could contend with.
