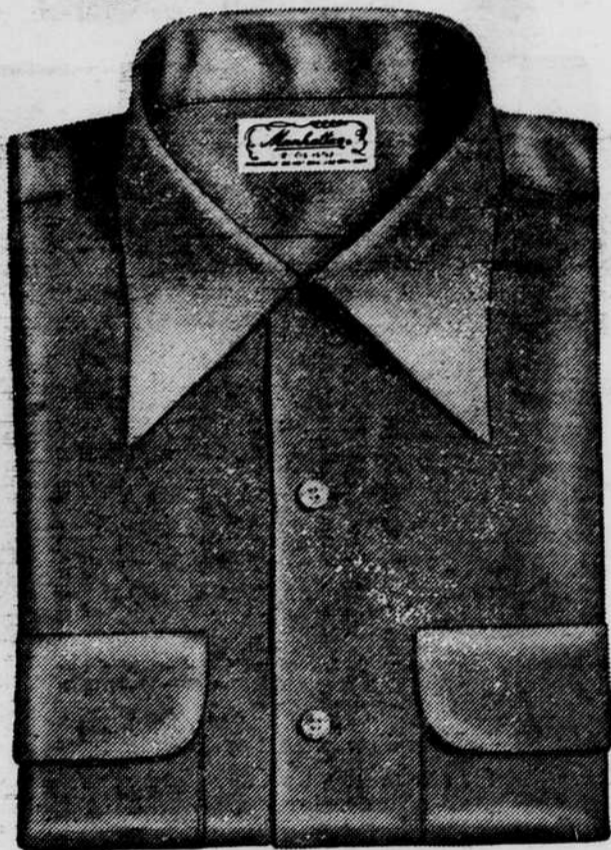

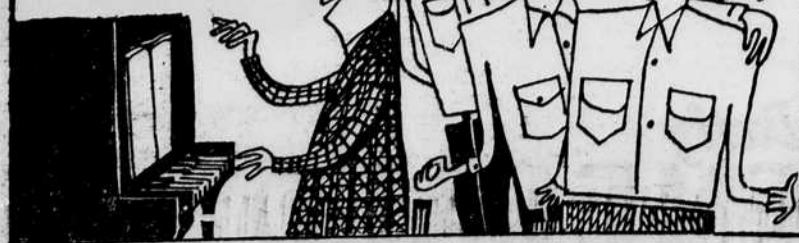

## Duck Paddlers Beat Aggies in Swim Meet

The University of Oregon swimming team easily defeated the Oregon State squad by the score of 61 to 23 Wednesday night at the men's pool. Gordon Edwards broke the Northern Division Conference record in the 440 yard freestyle with the time of 4:44.6 the mark previously set by Jack Medica of Washington in 1934. This time also ties his pool record set earlier in the season. Oregon diver Pete Charlton made a clear sweep in the diving

events with Hal Davis of Oregon placing second.

Oregon won both of the relays. In the 300 yd. medley relay Yosh Terado built up an early lead and Milton Kotoshirodo retained it. OSC managed to pull up on Harry Fuller but Oregon won by the margin of 10 yards with the time of 3:08.2. The 400 yd. freestyle relay was won by Dave Houck, Jim Allan, Yosh Terado and Milton Kotoshirodo with the time of 3:44.4.

## Ducks Prepare For OSC Beaver Invasion Friday

A weary Oregon basketball squad arrived in Eugene Tuesday from their grueling four-games-in-five nights invasion of the Inland Empire, where they won two of four games.

The Ducks still have a chance for a second place tie in the Northern division if they sweep both contests this weekend with the cellar-dwelling OSC Beavers. They won Friday night from WSC by a 71-61 count, and were nipped in the final seconds Saturday, 67-65, on a tip-in by Cougar Pete Mullins.

**Identical Scores**  
Against Idaho, the Ducks led off with a 66-60 win, Monday night, and were nipped Tuesday night by an identical 66-60 count.

Commenting on the games, Coach Bill Borchers said:

"Friday night against WSC, we played a fine game. Saturday we played equally well for two quarters, but seemed to fall apart in the latter part of the final half. We tried a ball-control game, but it didn't work."

"Monday against Idaho, we snapped back after a day of rest to play what was perhaps our best game of the season. We played well for three quarters Tuesday night, but ran out of gas in the fourth period."

**Hunt Lauded**  
Individuals who came in for praise from the Webfoot mentor were seniors Ken Hunt and Mel Streeter, plus Ken Wegner, a sophomore.

"Hunt," he said, "was playing the best basketball of his career. Not only was he scoring well, but he got a lot of assists. Streeter played especially well in the Idaho series, while Wegner showed much improvement throughout the whole trip. We will undoubtedly be counting on him a lot next season."

## Flashy Beaver

## Ken Hunt, Danny Johnston Race for Charmed Circle

Capt. Ken Hunt of Oregon and Danny Johnston of Oregon State, two of the highest scoring "little men" in the history of the Northern Division, will be gunning for a season scoring record no player under six feet tall has ever accomplished when the Beavers and the Ducks meet this weekend in the final two games of the 1952 conference season.

Both Hunt and Johnston have an excellent chance of cracking the "magic" 200-point mark in league competition, a total unmatched by "little men" in 30 years of conference play. Hunt, with 193 points, has already passed the previous high of 187 set by Oregon State's Wally Palmberg in 1936 and tied by OSC's Lew Beck in 1947.

Hunt will become the third Oregon player to crack 200 points, following Dick Wilkins' 207 in 1945 and Roger Wiley's 219 in 1948 and 235 in 1949. Johnston can become Oregon State's second 200-pointer, Red Rocha having hit 225 in 1945 and 215 in 1947.

## Mixed Bowling League Starts

The mixed doubles league, which will run during spring term in the SU bowling area begins on April 1st and 2nd at 6:30. There will be a total of 15 teams on each night. The four league winners will roll-off June 3rd. During the 9 week schedule, the tournament will feature a red pin in the set. If that pin is not knocked down with two balls which you get, it will cost the person 5c which will go into a fund for a party and dance of bowling participants.

Each bowler will pay \$1 with 10c extra going into a fund to pay for a party and a dance to be held on June 6. Start looking for a partner, or if you do not find a partner, sign up with Louie Bellissimo and he will get one for you. Sign up will continue until Mar. 11th. The four league winners will get individual trophies and the champion partners will get their names put on a trophy in the SU bowling alleys. The SU recreation committee is sponsoring the all-term tournament.

The Webfoot captain trailed Johnston most of the season, but jumped ahead with a sensational 74-point spree in the four games played over the weekend on the Inland Empire trip.

**Houbregs Breaks 200 Mark**  
Scoring 200 points in a conference season is a relatively new feat for Northern Division players. Oregon's Laddie Gale tallied 249 in 1938 during a 20 game season, but it was not until Gale Bishop pitched in 224 in 1943 that it was done in a 16-game season. Since that time 10 players have made the grade 15 times.

Rocha and Wiley were two of the five men who made it twice and the others include Washington's Jack Nichols with 204 (1947) and 265 (1948), WSC's Ed Gayda 212 (1949) and 200 (1950), and WSC's Vince Hanson with 253 (1945) and 220 (1948). In addition to Wilkins, Gene Conley of WSC tallied 220 points in 1950 to join Bishop among the players who have made it once.

Also, Washington's Bob Houbregs and Frank Guisness have made it this year with 219 and 200 points to their credit and two games to play against Washington State at Seattle this weekend.

**Idaho Hunt's 'Cousins'**  
Johnston's peak was reached when he tallied 23 points against Idaho at Corvallis and in the four games against the Vandals he accounted for 67 of his 174 points. He gathered the remainder of his total by scoring 43 against WSC, 38 in the Washington series and 26, in the first two games against Oregon.

Hunt's top single game was against Washington State at Pullman when he scored 21 points and in the four Cougar games he rolled up 64 points. His 20 points against Idaho at Eugene ranked second and his four-game total against the Vandals was 62. In the Washington series Hunt scored 45 points, his low of the year.
