Mt. St. Elias, 18,008 ft., is in the center of one of the most heavily glaciered regions in the world, exceeded in this respect only by the polar ice caps and Greenland. For this reason few men have penetrated the area. Six other attempts had been made before 1946 to climb the mountain during the 60 years of Alaska's mountaineering history. The only other successful ascent was made in 1897, when an Italian expedition led by the Duke of the Abruzzi reached the top from the Canadian side.
