Local draft boards will soon begin the annual process of reopening cases of all college students with educational deferments. Local boards can grant deferments for only one year under law, except for certain high school students.

College students who have made or who make 70 or above (75 for seniors who will take graduate work next year) on the selective service college qualification test or stand in the upper portions of their classes are eligible for consideration for further educational deferments.

Upper portions are one-half of next year's sophomore class, twothirds for next year's juniors, three-fourths for seniors and onehalf for graduate students.

-Ray Hawk, director of men's affairs, said draft boards in Oregon have been very lenient in granting educational deferments for University students in the past.

As of Feb. 29 there were 209,810 college students whose cases must be reopened at the end of the academic year. Hawk said it would be some time after spring term before all material from Oregon would be available to the draft boards to enable them to make their decisions.
