

Trackmen Topple Washington State

The University of Oregon trackmen practically cinched the Northern division dual meet championship by defeating Washington State at Hayward field Saturday 67½ to 63½.

As there are only two meets left with the comparatively weak teams of Idaho and Oregon State it looks like Coach Bill Bowerman may walk off with his second ND crown in four seasons at Oregon. Fortunately the two toughest foes, Washington and Washington State, were met on home ground.

The next meet with Idaho on May 3rd will be the Duck's only dual meet encounter away from home. Oregon State will come to Hayward field the next weekend. A week later the Northern division will take place in Seattle followed by the Pacific Coast conference meet at Eugene May 23-24.

Saturday's meet might have

been a duplicate of the Washington thriller if LaVerne Torgerson hadn't fallen early in the low hurdle event. He and Pete Mullins were running one-two up to that time.

Had they finished that way the score going into the mile relay would have been a narrow 64½ to 61½ margin for Oregon. The same situation existed last week against Washington.

As it turned out, strong second by pole-vaulter Ray Packwood and a third by Larry Blunt kept Oregon out of danger and allowed Bowerman to save the efforts of Bill Fell, Al Martin, and Jack Hutchins in the relay.

Ted Anderson, the fourth member of last week's record breaking team anchored Saturday's lap but was beaten by inches with Clint Richardson's fine drive in the final 20 yards.

Doug Clement proved himself to be a capable quarter miler as he

pushed Anderson all the way in the 440 yard run, and made up a 15

The only record erased Saturday was the old two-mile mark of 9:43.0 set in 1949 by Dick Paeth of WSC. The Cougars' sensational freshman, Jim Fisher, turned the distance in 9:35.2 with seeming ease.

Medford Grabs Hayward Relays Class 'A' Title

Medford high school took its eighth class 'A' Hayward relay Saturday, regaining the trophy from Klamath Falls who took it away from Medford last year. The 'B' crown was taken by Cottage Grove while Pleasant Hill won the 'C' division for the second straight year.

Cottage Grove unseated last year's winner, Ashland. Stayton took second and University High third. The only 'B' record to fall was in the Shuttle hurdles. The Cottage Grove trio set the new record at 37.1.

Pleasant Hill swamped all competition in taking the 'C' honors while breaking two records. Living up to expectations, Dale McCormick shattered Dean VanLeuven's shot put record of 45' 10½" by heaving the 12 pound ball 51' 1 9-11". The new mark of 11:45.8 in the distance medley bettered their own record of last year by eight seconds.

A close duel between Medford and Grant in the final mile relay topped off the class 'A' meet Saturday afternoon. With Medford ahead 63½ to 59, the G-men had to finish two places ahead of Medford to take the crown.

Second place was the best they could do, however. Medford's anchor man Don Spinus was barely able to beat off a determined drive by Doug Sandy of Grant in the final 220 yards.

Grants Pass took third and Jefferson of Portland finished fourth in one of the few relays that an 'A' standard wasn't bettered. Medford's two first places came in the shot and mile relay. They placed in all but one of the ten events, the distance medley.
