

Ducks Drop Portland Twice; Trackmen Top Idaho Vandals

78-53 Win Is Third Straight ND Nod

The University of Oregon track team kept its Northern Division record clear as it dumped the Idaho Vandals 78-53, Saturday at Moscow. The Ducks now hold three wins against no defeats in ND dual-meet competition.

The Webfoots were never threatened as they grabbed eight firsts and tied for another. Three Oregon tracksters added their names to the record books as they tied one meet mark and broke two others.

Al Martin cracked the mile standard of 4:28.4 set by Art Hamphrey of Idaho in 1947 as he loped home with a time of 4:26.8. Chet Noe put the shot 47 feet 7 inches to smash the old longest-distance of 46 feet 4 1/4 inches set by Oregon's Bob Anderson in 1951. In the 100-yard dash, Bill Fell tied the record which Dave Henthorne of Oregon set in 1950. The time was :09.7.

The Vandals' Bruce Sweeney sparked the losers with 16 points, garnering firsts in the broad jump and both hurdle events. He recorded the best time this year in the Northern division as he romped over the 120-yard high hurdles course in :14.7. This broke the meet mark of :15.1 set in 1949 by Keith Sean, also of Idaho.

Fell Leads Ducks

Fell was Oregon's top point-getter with 10, gaining firsts in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

Dunham Leads Whites to 30-18 Win; Two Weeks of Spring Drills Remain

Hal Dunham, stylish T-magician, was pitching strikes Saturday as the Whites topped the Greens, 30-18 Saturday in a game-type scrimmage which wound up the

second week of Webfoot spring drills.

Dunham hurled four touchdown passes, two of them to freshman Farrell Albright of 50 and 10 yards, and one each to End Monte Brethauer and Fullback Tom Novikoff for 25 and 65 yards.

The final White score was made by Novikoff on a line buck after several Dunham-Brethauer passes had brought the ball to the three.

Dean Van Leuvan, freshman fullback, led the Greens with a 70 yard gallop, and two other dashes of better than 30 yards each, which set the stage for the other two tallies.

Husky Cecil Hodges collected the other two TD's on short dashes after Van Leuvan had placed the ball in scoring position.

The scrimmage marked the halfway point in the 20 session spring drills. The Ducks have ten more sessions coming under the NCAA regulations and plan to finish each of the next two weeks drills with a game-type scrimmage similar to that played Saturday.

This gives them a total of about 30 workouts before the 1952 opener Sept. 20 against UCLA in Los Angeles, as they will have 20 drills after practice begins Sept. 1, not counting daily doubles.

The scrimmage Saturday was designed to emphasize offensive play. Lineman flashing top form were Tackle Len Berrie, Center Chuck Laird, End Hal Reeve, Guard John Reed, Guard Ken Sweitzer and End Dick Stoutt.

Siegmund To Star

On the mound, Coach Don Kirsch will probably start southpaw Don Siegmund who has been his top pitcher to date, against Coach Warren Tappin's Huskies.

The Saturday games, played at Portland, saw the Ducks win the opener, 8-2, and the night-cap, 5-4, in eight innings.

ern Division, continued their lusty hitting with eighteen safe blows for the two contests. Earlier in the season, the Webfoots had won another doubleheader at Eugene from the Pilots by 3-2 scores in each game.

First Baseman Ron Phillips was the Oregon leader at the plate, with two singles in the first game which drove in four runs, and a long fly and a single in the second tilt which pushed across two more.

Curveballing Bill Mays was the Duck relief "stopper" on the mound in both games, and won the second. Righthander Mays gained credit for seven strikeouts in the five innings he worked.

Averill Hits Well

The Webfoots led off scoring in the first tilt with three third-inning runs created by three walks, an error, and the first of Phillip's two singles.

Earl Averill led off fireworks in the fourth for Oregon with a triple, followed by Norv Ritchey's double and a single by George Shaw. These three blows accounted for two runs.

Averill also was a power at the plate for the winners, as he nearly pulled the "hat trick." He hit a single, double, and the above triple, lacking only a home run.

Phillips Breaks Tie

Righthander Bill Bottler performed well for the Ducks in the five innings he worked on the mound, as he gave up just four hits and one unearned run.

Portlander Don Piro paced Coach Art McLarney's men at the plate, with two for two. He clouted a sixth-inning homer, and contributed a single which drove in the other run in the first.

Phillips led the Ducks to victory in the second game as he hit a long fly to left field in the eighth with the bases jammed, and Leftfielder Jim Livesay scored after the catch. The run broke up a 4-4 deadlock.

In the bottom of the eighth, Portland threatened as the first batter singled. He was sacrificed to second but Mays struck out

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Golfers Top OSC In ND Opener

The University of Oregon golf team, coached by Sid Mulligan, was victorious in their first conference meet of the season at the Corvallis country club Saturday. The Webfoots defeated the Beavers 19-8, inflicting the second straight division loss upon the Aggie squad.

Bob Atkinson and Sophomore Al Mundle turned in the winning score of 63 between them over Osborn and Ross of OSC, to win the morning best ball action.

The afternoon session was equally successful for the Ducks as they managed to defeat the Staters 13-5 in the individual play. Al Mundle again showed his talents in afternoon play as he copped the medalist honors with a two under par 70, defeating Ross of OSC who came in with an 82.

Webfoot captain Ron Clark defeated Bill Kessinger for the runner-up position, 71-82.

Largely responsible for the Webfoot win were freshman netters Bill Rose and Jack Neer. In singles play, Rose downed George Allison, 6-4, 6-2; and Neer topped Ed Dey, 6-0, 6-2. Then the two teamed up in the final and deciding doubles match to defeat OSC's number one combination of Allison and Don Megale in a three set battle, 1-6, 6-4, 7-5.

The surprise of the day was furnished in the number one singles match when Megale downed Tom MacDonald, 6-4, 6-4.

A return match will be played on the University courts Wednesday, April 30.
