

For Your Consideration: Records Of Incumbent Senate Candidates

(Ed. note: As a service to students voting in Wednesday's general election, the Emerald is printing a resume of ASUO senate records of all incumbents seeking office for next year. In Tuesday's paper, a brief sketch of the activity records of non-incumbent candidates will be run, since these candidates have not served on the senate.)

Today's incumbent resume gives attendance, roll call voting records and senate committee and other senate positions. No attempt was made to judge what an excused absence would be, if such a situation would exist. This article is based on the official minutes of senate meetings, except for the last meeting—April 17.)

Eleven incumbents are running for next year's senate, two for ASUO president, seven for senate-at-large, one for junior class president, and one for sophomore class representative.

These are the incumbent candidates:

Mary Alice Baker, AGS, running for senate-at-large (now senator-at-large).

Bob Brittain, AGS, running for junior class president (now sophomore class president).

Don Collin, USA, running for senator-at-large (now junior class vice-president).

Pat Dignan, AGS, running for ASUO president (now senator-at-large).

Bill Frye, AGS, running for senate-at-large (now senator-at-large).

Al Karr, USA, running for senate-at-large, now sophomore class representative).

Mike Lally, AGS, running for senate-at-large (now junior class president).

Jim Light, AGS, running for senate-at-large (now freshman class representative).

Judy McLoughlin, USA, running for senate-at-large (now sophomore class vice-president).

Jane Simpson, AGS, running for senior class representative (now junior class representative).

Miss Baker, Brittain, Frye, Miss Jackson, Karr, Lally, Miss McLoughlin and Miss Simpson were elected last spring. Collin was elected by the senate Oct. 18 to replace Don Paillette. Dignan was elected by the senate Jan. 17 to replace Shirley Korpela. Light was elected by the freshman class Jan. 23.

Their Attendance

Their Positions

The following are the senate committee and delegate records of the senators running in the present election:

Miss Baker—Appointed to Vodvil chairman screening committee and the joint senate-SU board committee screening candidates for board membership; volunteered to serve on Millrace committee.

Brittain—Appointed to rally board screening committee, Dads' day chairman screening committee, orientation-leadership plan investigation committee, committee to investigate Bob Peterson's fall term basketball ineligibility (This committee never operated, since the matter was quickly settled, according to Lally head of the committee).

Collin—Appointed to committee to investigate rally board portion of the constitution (was committee chairman), Duck Preview chairman screening committee, primary proposal investigating committee; volunteered to serve on phone committee and committee to investigate the constitution to propose amendments.

Dignan—Appointed chairman of the primary investigating committee; volunteered to serve on constitutional investigating committee (amendments).

Frye—Appointed to Homecoming chairman screening committee, but declined the appointment; appointed to accompany the ASUO president to the Oregon Federation of College Leaders conference; appointed to investigating committee (rally board), Duck Preview screening committee; orientation-leadership plan committee (chairman), primary investigating committee. (Ed. Note: Printed above is a sample ballot for the ASUO presidential and senator-at-large race. The voter will indicate his preference for each candidate, "1," "2," etc.; the one with the greatest amount of number one votes will be elected ASUO president; the candidate with the next highest number will be named vice-president. Remaining offices will be filled on the "quota" basis, to be explained Tuesday. Although there are 24 candidates and only 11 offices to be filled, the voter should vote for all 24 candidates, ASUO vice-president Merv Hampton advised, since this would increase the chances of all the voter's preferences being made effective.)

(Ed. Note: A sample ballot for the class office elections Wednesday is depicted above. Although this ballot is for the senior class race, the ballots for sophomore and junior classes are identical in principle. The preferential voting system is also used for class elections. Four positions are to be filled—president, vice-president, and two representatives—and this year there are only four candidates on each class ballot, because the two political parties again agreed to put up only the minimum number of candidates, and no non-partisan candidate filed. Highest number of first place votes will decide the presidential race; second highest will elect the vice-president. Remaining two candidates will be class representatives.)

(Ed note: The following is an amendment to the ASUO constitution which will appear on the ballot April 30, the general student body election date.)

Amendment to ASUO Constitution

The ASUO Senate proposes to the Associated Students of the University of Oregon that:

Article VI, Section IV (Dates of Elections) be amended to change Freshman elections from after the first and prior to the fifth week of winter term, to after the fifth and prior to the eighth week of fall term.
