

Washington Wallops Webfoots, 6-5

University of Oregon's erratic infield suffered a relapse Tuesday afternoon on Howe field, which enabled the University of Washington Huskies to limp home with a 6-5, 10 inning Pacific Coast conference Northern Division triumph.

The defeat was a bitter one for Don Kirsch's Ducks, who struck with some five o'clock lightning in the ninth inning to throw the game into overtime. But three errors in the top half of the tenth wiped out Oregon's league lead and dropped them into a tie with the Oregon State college Beavers.

Bill Mays, the Webfoots' third hurler, was the victim of the collapse. The burly right hander fanned the totum pole, Bob Houbregs, to open the frame. Right fielder Gordon Rodland sent an easy roller to Third baseman Earl Averill, who promptly booted it. Averill then gummed up Bill Stuht's slash and Second sacker Roland Halle bounced out to Mays on the sacrifice.

Footballer Bill Earley whacked one to Daryle Nelson; Oregon's keystoner kicked it and Rodland tallied the leading and eventual winning tally.

Stuht was a larcenous artist in the home half of the tenth, robbing George Shaw a certain doubt on his knee-high line drive. After Ron Phillips had been nicked on the elbow by a Jim Routhaus pitch, Pete Williams lofted to deep left. Pinch hitter Norm Forbes ended the threat on a well-hit grounder to the hot-corner guard. Stuht made a nice pickup and caught Forbes by a stride.

Husky Mentor Warren Tappin was forced to yank his third pitch-

er, southpaw Bob Bell, in the ninth. Bill Bottler drew a base on balls and was lifted for a pinch runner, Duane Owens. Nelson fouled out to Catcher Sam White, but Livesay was issued a free ticket.

Averill spanked a line single to center field, which registered Bottler and sent Livesay to third. Livesay was nearly thrown out on a close play from Larry Herns to Stuht. Averill moved on to second after the throw.

Rothaus was called in at this point and Joe Sugura greeted the right hander with a scorching shot

past second base. Shortstopper Earley dove headlong into the dirt in a vain effort to cut off the base hit. Livesay scored the tying run. Ron Bottler rapped into a twin-killing to end the rally.

Houbregs of the Huskies and Oregon's Gordon Aune hooked up in a scoreless duel for the first three innings, but the visitors snapped the string in the fourth panel. Mitchell, who is a second-string quarterback and a basketball guard, walloped a fly ball over Livesay's head and circled the bases for the home run.

Wasting no time, the Ducks overcame the lead immediately. Averill unloaded a 375-foot triple to the far reaches of right center field and scored when Sugura chopped a ground ball double down the left field stripe. A single by Ron Bottler, a walk to George Shaw and Phil Settecase's ground bingle to right field produced the tie-breaker.

The Ducks' advantage was short-lived as Aune passed Stuht to open the fifth. Halle fanned, but the Huskies rapped Aune for three consecutive singles, although

two of them were tainted. Earley grounded to Nick Schmer, deep in the hole, Tom Absher rapped a legitimate blow past Averill and Morrison dumped a Texas leaguer in front of Shaw, and two runs scored.

Bottler, who put down the fifth stanza uprising, thanks to an unassisted double play by Averill, was rocked for another pair of Washington tallies in the sixth. Houbregs whacked a single over the shortstop, Rodland walked, Stuht bunted and Earley sent a weak tap to Nelson, who bobbled the ball and allowed both runners to score.

Oregon chased Dick Murchy to the showers in the seventh with consecutive singles by Nelson, Livesay and Averill, which resulted in a single marker. Sugura ripped a fast ball over the left field bank, a mile long, but a mile foul, and then grounded into a double play.

Averill partly made up for his fielding miscues with a lively afternoon at the plate; he rapped out four hits in five trips. Mitchell collected three more safties in four trips to boost his Northern Division average to .469.

Washington salvaged its Willamette valley invasion after losing three times to the OSC Beavers and the Ducks. Oregon's next contest is scheduled for a week from today in Moscow, Idaho against the University of Idaho Vandals.
