

Staples in Browsing Room Talk on 'Agate Fantasies'

"Agate Fantasies" will be discussed by L. W. Staples, professor of geology, at 7:30 tonight in the browsing room lecture at the Student Union.

The lecture will consist of lantern slides of agate sections and other minerals as seen in ordinary and polarized light. Staples will discuss the origin of agates and exhibits of agates and books on the subject will be on display in the browsing room.

Don Adams, president of the Eugene Mineral Society, will lead discussion following the lecture.

Staples has been at Oregon since 1939. He previously taught at the Michigan College of Mining and Technology, Stanford and Oregon State.

A new mineral was discovered by Staples in 1935. He named it

"austinite," after a favorite Stanford professor and mineralogist, Austin Flint Rogers.

Staples is a fellow of the American Mineralogical society and the Geological society of America. He was formerly chief geologist for the Horse Heaven mines at Horse Heaven, Oregon, a geologist with the Michigan Geological survey and consulting geologist of the Isle Royale Copper company in Michigan. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Xi Sigma Psi and the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineering.

The American Journal of Science and the Mineralogist magazine have published articles by Staples and he also has a section on micro-chemistry in the book "Introduction to the Study of Minerals."

New Co-op Circulates Blanks To Residents of Amazon Project

Thornburg, a member of the tentative co-op board, has gone to

San Francisco to contact a co-op warehouse there. He plans to make arrangements to stock the store with Co-op label goods. A man will be sent to Portland to contact the co-op warehouse located there, also.

Provisions will be made whereby a limited number of persons may come into the co-op on an extended payment plan calling for a \$27.50 membership fee. In such a case, only the regular \$25.00 membership fee will be refundable upon withdrawal from the organization. At least 60 shares, fully paid, will be necessary for the opening of the Webfoot Consumers Co-op, according to the organizers.
