

# Stassen, Warren to Speak At Willamette Convention

Two Republican presidential candidates—Harold Stassen of Minnesota and Gov. Earl Warren of California—will speak at Willamette University's mock political convention today, according to Tom Barry, head of the 27 delegates who will represent the University of Oregon at the one-day meet.

Other political big wheels lined up for the convention are Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, honorary convention chairman; Gov. Frank Carlson of Nebraska, the keynote speaker; and Gov. Douglas McKay of Oregon.

**Twelve Colleges Participating**  
Twelve colleges and universities from throughout Oregon will participate in the convention.

Plenary sessions for the convention will begin at 10 a.m. followed by caucuses at 1:30 p.m. A banquet will be held at 5:30 p.m. and the nominating session will get under way at 7:30 p.m. The nominating proceedings will be broadcast by radio station KGW of Portland.

Oregon will represent Wisconsin, with 30 votes; Michigan, with 46 votes; and Illinois, with 60 votes.

## Yiyar Speaks On UO Campus

"India Day", sponsored by Majlis, foreign students' cultural group on campus, opens today with an address by Sir C. P. Ramaswami Yiyar, a former Prime Minister of Travancore in South India.

Sir Ramaswami will speak at 4 p.m. DST in the Dad's Lounge of the Student Union on "The Challenge of Communism in Asia". The talk is part of the religious conferences in session on the campus today.

A dinner, open to the public, will be held in Sir Ramaswami honor at the Faculty Club at 6 p.m. DST. Tickets are \$1.25, and are available at the registration desk during the religious conferences.

An informal discussion on Hindu philosophy, and presentation of Indian music and art and a showing of Indian films will follow the dinner.

Sir Ramaswami will be the guest speaker at the 9:30 and 11 a.m. DST services at the Eugene Congregational Church. His topic will be "India's Religious Philosophy."

## Confab Topic Is US Religion

Professors from four western states will attend the fifth annual Northwest conference on religion in higher education to be held on the Oregon campus Friday and today.

Held jointly with a philosophy of religion session, the conference will feature the Rev. Donald MacPherson Baillie and Daniel Summer Robinson as key speakers.

Reverend Baillie is from the University of St. Andrews in Fife, Scotland, where he is professor of systematic theology.

Robinson is professor of philosophy and director of the school of philosophy at the University of Southern California at Los Angeles.

Reverend Baillie will speak on "What is Dead and What is Living in Christianity" at the main address of the conference Friday night. He will also speak Saturday on "Christianity in Education Today."

Robinson will speak Friday afternoon and Saturday morning on the same topics.

Odell, John Lang Anderson and Hideo Hashimoto, all of Lewis and Clark college; Edwin Garlan, Reed college; Edward Kollman, Willamette university; Jame L. Martin, College of Idaho; John Magee, College of Puget Sound; William Jones, dean of administration, University of Oregon; Roy McCall, head of the department of speech in the University; and Oregon State Senator Philip Hitchcock of Klamath Falls.
