

506 Moms Sign For Weekend

Five hundred and six mothers were registered for the 25th anniversary Mothers Weekend, held in conjunction with Junior Weekend. The number represented a drop of more than 20 per cent over last years registration of mothers, which totaled 689.

Alpha Delta Pi and Phi Delta Theta carried away the awards—record albums—for largest percentage of mothers on campus for the weekend. ADPi was tops among women's organizations with 64 per cent and Phi Delt earned the same honors in men's competition with 57 per cent.

Second and third places in registration of mothers went to Alpha Phi and Gamma Phi Beta for women and to Phi Kappa Sigma and Sigma Alpha Mu for men.

Approximately 270 mothers attended the breakfast in Carson hall, according to Joan Lawson, general chairman of the event. This too was a decrease from last year's attendance, which was 350.

Approximately seventy people are expected to attend the proceedings, Bill Carey, outgoing ASUO president revealed. 


