

PCC Meet Will Feature International Track Talent

There will be a definite international flavor to the entry list when the Pacific Coast Conference stages its 22nd championship track and field meet at Hayward Field in Eugene on May 23 and 24.

Canada, Australia, Sweden and the Territory of Hawaii will have at least 10 athletes on hand representing five schools when the University of Oregon plays host to the final 1952 league test of the toughest track conference in the nation.

Oregon and Washington State

will each have three men, Washington two, and California and Stanford one from outside the United States. Oregon's entries include Jack Hutchins, veteran middle distance man, Fred Turner, miler and two-miler, and Doug Clement, freshman quarter-miler. All are natives of Canada.

The Cougars will send Leo Roinonen in the javelin, Phil Matson in the mile and Pete Mullins in the hurdles. Roinonen and Matson are Canadians and Mullins is a native of Australia.

Washington's representation includes George Widenfelt, the talented Swedish decathlon champion, and Bill Hutchinson, a fine rookie sprinter from Canada. Stanford has Ian Reed, a discus thrower who has already qualified for the Australian Olympic team. Reed was unable to return for his country's trials, so he made his bid in San Francisco under the supervision of AAU officials.

Hawaii will be represented by California's fine half-miler, Jim Hutchinson. The talented Bear has been troubled by an early season injury, but could be a serious threat to the conference's best if he regains his top form.

Four of this talented group, Hutchins, Widenfelt, Roinonen and Mullins are veterans of the 1948 Olympic Games at London and all are given an excellent chance to make this summer's junket to Helsinki for the 1952 world track classic.

Oregon Golfers Defeat Beavers; ND Tourney Next

The Oregon golf team easily defeated the Oregon State squad Tuesday at the Eugene Country club by the wide margin of 25½-11½. The Ducks played consistent golf but were not at their peak as they were in their previous match against the University of Washington.

Oregon swept the best ball action, taking all of the nine points. Ron Clark and Bob Atkinson teamed up to defeat Kessinger and Osbourn of OSC 67-71. Captain Ron Clark played good all around golf and he especially excelled on his iron play.

In the individual rounds three Oregon men tied for the Medalist honors; Ron Clark, Fred Mueller and Al Mundle all scored a 73 par 72. Al Mundle showed the Staters his skills in his full smooth stroke. He is always well grooved and never is in trouble, using his medium long drive and in this way manages to maintain a great deal more accuracy.

Soph Don Krieger shot a 73 against Duncan of OSC and he retained his consistent exceptional play around the green, especially his chip shots and putting.

Oregon picked up 16½ points to 1½ for the Beavers in the individual rounds.

The match with OSC winds up the conference match play with Oregon having an undefeated season in winning the eight matches they have played. Coach Sid Milligan expects tough competition in the Northern Division playoff in Moscow. Washington, who didn't show its full strength in their dual meet with Oregon, and Idaho, who will be playing on their home course, will be the top title contenders.

Dick Zimmerman, hurdler, has also been out with an old injury and it is doubtful whether he will be able to compete in the Seattle meet.

The outstanding performances of Jack Smith and Emery Barnes in the OSC meet last weekend are some encouragement to Bowerman who is hoping they can keep up the good work. He stated that Oregon would have little chance of winning the crown without at least two of the four injured men being in shape by Saturday.

Huskies Top Oregon In Wild, 11-8 Game

SEATTLE, (AP) — The University of Washington whipped Oregon 11-8 Tuesday in a game that resembled the Saturday meeting of a marching society more than it did baseball.

The statistics went something like this:

Twenty-three walks; 12 errors; 9 wild pitches; 2 passed balls; 2 hit batsmen, and 25 men left on base.

The loss cut Oregon's lead in the Northern Division to half a game over Oregon State.

There were only 15 hits in the 19 runs game, most of the trouble coming from pitcher inability to find the strike zone. Washington scored four runs in the second inning on six walks and a lonesome single.

The added clusters of three each in the third and fifth again mostly on gift bases.

Oregon's big inning was the seventh when three walks, two hit batsmen, an error and a couple of wild pitches gave the visitors four runs without a hit.

Oregon used five pitchers Washington two and both were relieved when the third comedy ended.

Major League Baseball Results

Seven games were played Tuesday night in the major leagues, including a full slate of four in the American. Tuesday afternoon in the National league, the Brooklyn Dodgers defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 14 to 8.

A great pitching job by lefty Curt Simmons gave the Philadelphia Phils a 6 to 0 victory over the Chicago Cubs. Out of the army only a few weeks, Simmons struck out 12 Cub batters and limited the losers to a pair of singles—by Frank Baumholtz and Bob Ramazotti. Simmons walked only two batters and wasn't in trouble at all.

The New York Giants increased their National league lead to one full game by defeating the Cincinnati Reds, 7 to 4. Three Giant home runs helped win the game for Larry Jansen who now has copped three in a row.

The Cleveland Indians used three home runs to good advantage and defeated the world champion New York Yankees for the fourth straight time, 10 to 6. A three-run homer by Ray Boone, a two-run clout by Larry Doby and a solo blast by Dale Mitchell paced the league leading Tribe's 15-hit spree off four Yankee pitchers.

The seventh-place Boston Braves pushed Pittsburgh deeper into the National league cellar by beating the Pirates, 3 to 1. Pittsburgh has won only five of 26 games.

The Washington Senators made only five hits, but they were enough to defeat the Detroit Tigers, 4 to 3. The victory enabled the surprising Senators to win their ninth game in ten starts and retain second place in the American league.

Tiny Bobby Shantz pitched a five hitter and blasted a triple and double to lead the Philadelphia Athletics over the St. Louis Browns, 5 to 1. It was Shantz's fifth victory—more than half of the club's nine triumphs. He struck out seven and space five singles.

The Chicago White Sox moved into a tie for fifth place in the American league by beating the Boston Red Sox, 5 to 0.

Varsity Netmen To Leave Today For ND Tourney

Heading for Pullman, Washington and the annual Northern Division tennis tournament this afternoon will be the varsity net team, second-placers in the recently ended dual match play. The tourney will be played Friday and Saturday on the Washington State courts, with four players from each of the five Northern Division clubs competing in the singles and doubles action.

The tournament is conducted on a point basis, with the school accumulating the largest total being declared winner. Points are distributed on a system which has the winners of singles or doubles play getting five points, runners-up three, quarter finalists two points each, and the first round winners getting one point each. Thus winners in both singles and doubles would give a school ten points, placing runners-up in both events would be worth six points, etc.

Last year's winner, for the twelfth time in a row, was the University of Washington, with the Webfoots coming in second. The Huskies, on the basis of dual match action this season, will be favored to repeat, but Coach Bob Laurence believes his men have a fairly good chance of unseating the defending titlists.

The job of doing this will be largely up to Laurence's top three singles men, Tom Macdonald, Bill Rose, and Jack Neer. Macdonald, a semi-finalist last year, Laurence regards as a definite contender for the singles championship, and teaming up with Neil George in doubles, he should also help to rack up some points there.

"Rose could also go all the way in singles," Laurence stated Tuesday. "As the only undefeated player on the squad, he will probably be placed near the top in seatings, which will be determined Thursday night."

Neer, although he had a bad day at Saturday's Washington match, should also help the Oregon cause considerably, particularly in doubles, where he will team with Rose.

Veteran Neil George, a doubles semi-finalist last year, will round out the four man squad.

The tourney will be the final action of the season for the Ducks.
