Moscow Hosts Link Tourney

The University of Oregon golf team will go into the Northern Division playoffs with an undefeated record Saturday at the University course in Moscow, Ida. The Duck linksmen, under the guidance of Coach Milligan are primed for the coming meet and expect stiff competition from their old rivals, the University of Washington. The Ducks have defeated the Washington squad in a dual meet and have four straight decisions in conference play this season.

Four Men Each

Each school will enter a four man team and the aggregate 35 hole medal play scores will determine the winning team. Coach Milligan has selected the Duck quartet who has proven its consistency throughout the dual meet season.

The team is composed of Captain Ron Clark, who is a senior and a two year letterman, sophomore Don Kreiger, whose under par golf has given him medalist honors, Bob Atkinson who has all around good golf on both his short and long game, and sophomore Al Mundle will round out the squad to constitute what Milligan feels will be the winning combination.

Last year the Huskies managed to edge the Oregon Ducks in the Northern Division title playoff to end their undefeated season by a six point margin, 604-610. The Washington squad is hopeful of a repeat performance again this year.

Coach Milligan also expects some excellent golf from both the Washington State squad and the University of Idaho quartet, who are familiar with the short par 70 course in Moscow.

The team left for the Inland Empire Wednesday and will have a chance to tour the University course several times to accustom themselves to it.

Zener came back on the back nine, though, and on the 18th hole got a par to Harding's bogey to take the nine and tie the 18. In the final analysis it could be seen that both men had 76's, and the match score was 1 1/2 apiece.

Mac Little made short work of his opponent, George Nitschelm as he scored a 76 and took the match 3-0. In the remaining contest Byron Tarr took three additional points from Hal Lemon to give the Fiji's a final score of 10 1/2 to the Phi Psis 1 1/2.
