'Raids' Gather Clothes

men and moving around the campus to pick up old clothes dropped from windows by women's living groups. When the men were done, women would visit men's houses and pick up more clothes. Late hours were granted women.

At Hendricks hall, three and possibly six or seven men broke in but apparently caused little or no damage. Reports on the incident were conflicting but, said one girl, two of the men got tossed into the showers. The women, it was also reported, fought back with fire hoses and the area outside the hall on the driveway was soaked.

According to Mrs. Zoa Burdick, Hendricks head resident, everything had been going smoothly when "the first thing I knew they (men) were up on the fire escape." Two of the men forced their way in by opening a lower window, she said.

Ray Hawk, director of men's affairs, who was on the scene, reported it was the only place where the situation had gotten the least bit out of hand. Several men broke in, he said, but the only effect was to scare the females as they ran down the hall, he remarked.

Students came up with the idea of sending undies to OSC Dean of Men Dan Polling for "needy OSC students."

The YMCA and YWCA had a clothing drive set for Friday. They agreed to the plan.

The men started a move a little after 9 p.m. In three University trucks they visited Highland house and then went on to University house. They carried signs reading "Klothes for Korea", "Lingerie for Lemons", "Panties for Poling", "Bloomers for Boomers" and "Down With Panties." They chanted "We want panties," and twice stopped to burn straw from the truck beds in the street.

Some of them when they got the lingerie, stopped to put it on. They wore bras stuffed with straw, women's swimming suits, panties and skirts.

Koreans won't be too warm with the clothing obtained by the men. They called for panties and bras and that's what they got. There were a few jeans, peddle pushers and shirts.

When the women's turn came, after most of the men had dispersed, a few more garments were collected for Korea—but again all

was not sweetness and light.

At Alpha Tau Omega water from a hose was applied and a few women were hauled up on the lawn and doused. There were some clothes forthcoming and at the Sigma Alpha Mu house a few more were soaked.

Here, the women were chanting "We want jockey shorts." The men responded with clothes.

The same treatment—the water treatment—was handed them at the Vet's dorms, Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Sigma Chi.

At Phi Delta Theta a lull was followed by another dousing; then the Sigma Phi Epsilon house was passed by without slowing down (Sig Ep men were coming out of the door). Nothing happened at Kappa Sigma, Sigma Nu repeated the H2O treatment, as did Phi Kappa Psi. By this time a clothes-collection was a thing of the past.

The millrace houses were scratched from the program and the groups headed for familiar grounds. The gluttons for punishment received overhead dousing from Phi Gamma Delta and more water from Campbell Club.

The women then headed for Carson hall amid such comments as "We just didn't accomplish a thing," and "Isn't this fun?" (a sarcastic note detected).

Bob Richardson, freshman in business, slipped and fell to the pavement as he was trying to climb out of one of the trucks on 13th avenue between the Student Union and Carson hall.

Ray Hawk, director of men's affairs, said he believed that Richardson was not badly hurt. An ambulance was called.
