Red Infiltration Danger Affirmed

The head of the central intelligence agency, Gen. Bedell Smith, said Monday that he believes that Communists can infiltrate every security agency in the country, including his own. However, he said that he did not know the identity of any Communists in the CIA, because if he did, he would get rid of them at once.

He also defended Gen. George C. Marshall against the charges of Sen. Joe McCarthy (R-Wis.) that the Marshall plan had been of massive helpfulness to the Kremlin because it substituted for a plan of direct military aid.

General Smith made the statement at a hearing of Senator McCarthy's two-million-dollar libel suit against Sen. William Benton (D-Conn.). The statement brought a quick reaction in the GOP headquarters, where it was announced that the former representative Clair Booth Luce will make a special radio-television broadcast Wednesday night on "General Smith's shocking revelation."

Adlai Denies Improper Influence

Gov. Adlai Stevenson declared Monday night before a nationwide radio and television audience that none of the Illinois state officials whose pay he supplemented from private donations could have been improperly influenced.

The Democratic presidential nominee said he gave the officials the supplementary pay, adding that he could have discharged them at any time.

Speaking about the progress of his campaign, Stevenson commented, "I have done the best I could to talk sense to the American people."

Ike Invades South Carolina Today

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will be the first presidential candidate of a major party to talk in South Carolina since before the Civil war, when he again invades the South today for an address in Columbia, S. C. He probably will not make public his financial facts and figures before starting on the trip.

'Peace' Conference Convenes

The Peiping radio has announced that the once-delayed Asian "peace conference" will open in the Red capital Thursday. Some 12 Americans are expected to attend the Communist propaganda festival. The state department is keeping tab on them.

Lewis Signs Coal Peace

John L. Lewis and the northern coal operators have signed a contract calling for a \$1.90 a day pay boost. The operators' spokesmen have said, however, that the pay boost can't be paid until it is approved by the government wage stabilization board.

Comies Attack in Korea

Chinese Reds used tanks, heavy artillery and troops in eight heavy attacks along the Korean front Monday. Allied defenders repulsed six of the drives in temperatures dropping below zero.

Venezuela Crushes Revolt

The government of Venezuela announced Monday the crushing of an attempt at rebellion in which five persons were killed and ten wounded.

Fulbright Awards Applications Due For Study Abroad

Applications for the Fulbright Awards for Students must be in to K. S. Ghent, associate professor of mathematics, by October 31.

Students who plan to apply for the scholarships must be citizens of the United States, have a bachelor's degree or its equivalent by the time they plan to study abroad and have a knowledge of the language of the country sufficient enough to carry on study and research properly, Ghent said.

The applications for study in Australia and New Zealand must be in by Oct. 15, Ghent said. He also added that students this year have a choice of two newly opened countries for study—West Germany and Finland.

Deady to House Math Following March Completion

Deady hall the oldest building on the campus, which formerly housed the physics and biology departments is being completely renovated at a cost of \$107,000 and is expected to be ready for use in March.

Work was begun this term by physical plant employees who are revamping the air conditioning system, replacing floors, wiring and covering new, lowered ceilings with acoustical tile.

Military Department To Sponsor Chosen Varsity Rifle Team

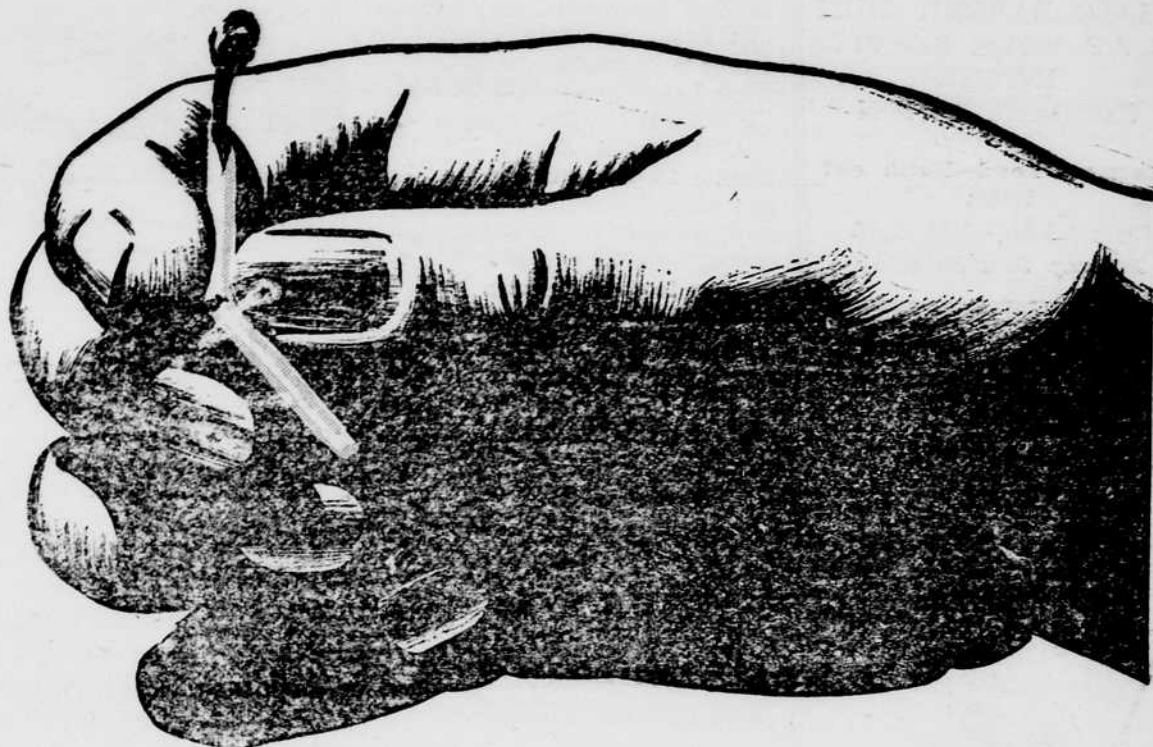
The University varsity rifle team is being organized under the sponsorship of the military department. Tryouts are being held at the ROTC range every afternoon this week from 3 to 5 p.m.
