Ike Blast Cheered By South Carolina

A crowd estimated by police at 50,000 turned out Tuesday to hear a speech by General Eisenhower at Columbia, South Carolina.

The Republican presidential candidate went on to attack Stevenson for, what he said, was a claim by the Democratic nominee in Los Angeles recently that the people get what they deserve in politics and that honor and nobility of politics at most levels are empty phrases.

He asked his audience if they feel to blame, as he put it, for "The Washington mess," for the steady increase of Communist power, including loss of China, and for what he called "The fact that seven years after winning the second World War, our country still has no clear, positive program for peace."

Eisenhower said: "Our economy now is a war economy and our so called prosperity is a war prosperity." He said it was all the result of an administration he said has been too long in power.

Governor James Byrnes, an Eisenhower backer, introduced Eisenhower. It's the third time the General has campaigned in the South.

The next item on Eisenhower's schedule a plane flight to Cleveland, Ohio, this evening.

Statements on Reds Sent Two Candidates

General Walter Bedell Smith said Tuesday that he had sent statements to the two presidential candidates, Eisenhower and Stevenson.

General Smith is the Director of the Central Intelligence agency. He testified Monday at a deposition hearing in the two-million dollar libel-slander suit filed by Republican Senator Joseph McCarthy against Democratic Senator William Benton of Connecticut.

After testifying, Smith issued a statement saying he was acting on the assumption that Communists, as he put it, had penetrated security agencies somewhere along the line from charwomen to its executive level.

The House Un-American activities committee has voted to subpoena General Smith to appear before it and tell what he knows about Communists in the U. S. government.

Truman Talk Attacks Republicans

President Truman attacked the Republicans again Tuesday night in a brief speech at the ground breaking ceremonies for Tiber Dam in Montana.

This was one of nine stops Truman is making in his tour through Montana. At the little town of Havre the President said that after the war, while Eisenhower was still commanding general of our forces in Europe, the General saw no reason why Russia and the U.S. would not remain the closest possible friends.

Adlai Praised on Speech

Telegrams have been piling up in Governor Stevenson's headquarters at Springfield, Illinois, congratulating him on his radio and T-V speech from Chicago Monday night.

Stevenson went over the messages and said, "I have tried to tell the truth about our world as I see it and I am grateful that so many people want to hear it and are eager to face it."

Governor Stevenson declared Tuesday night that the question of keeping Communists out of government must never become a political football. Stevenson made his statement in Springfield, Illinois, in commenting on remarks by General Walter Bedell Smith, head of the Central Intelligence agency.

Army Reveals Atomic Shell Gun

The Army told newsmen in Washington, D. C. Tuesday the story of its new 85-ton artillery piece, believed to be the first gun ever designed to fire atomic shells.

The Army didn't say precisely, but indicated that only ordinary high explosive charges have been used so far, no atomic shells. The Army called the gun an "all-purpose weapon" and made clear what its meant for eventually. It's believed capable of firing 20 miles.

Heads of Houses Discuss Rules for Pledges, Dinners

Pledge regulations and plans for the annual Hazel C. Schwering dime dinner were the main topics of discussion when the Heads of Houses met for the first time this year on Sept. 29.

Pat Ward, head of the group representing women's living organizations, announced that all pledges must remain in their dormitories on Monday nights in accordance with a decision made last spring.

It was also announced that pledges may not go to their sororities for the Bunion Derby Friday night. They will be required to remain in their present living organizations during the required hours.

Monday Last Day For Registration

Students who drop classes after that date must receive a grade from the instructor. If that grade should be an F, it will be recorded as a permanent grade.
