Five University of Oregon journalism professors will speak in Oregon cities before civic organizations in observance of National Newspaper week starting Wednesday. Carl Webb, assistant professor of journalism, outlined speaking engagements Tuesday.

Thursday, Webb, who is a national committee man of the Newspapers Associations Managers, Inc., will speak before the East Side Rotary club in Portland, and Willard Thompson, assistant professor of journalism, will meet with the Springfield Kiwanis. Oct. 7, Charles Duncan, associate professor of journalism, will speak in Hillsboro for the Elks lodge; Oct. 8, Dean Gordon Sabine will address the Coos Bay Elks; and on Oct. 16, Paul J. Deutschmann, as-

sistant professor of journalism, will speak at a meeting sponsored by the Elks lodge of Toledo.

National Newspaper week which is sponsored by the Newspaper association was first observed in 1939. Their goal is to let the community know the vital role newspapers play in obtaining civic improvements and better government. It has 38 members from a cross-section of state, regional and national associations. Local organizations, encouraged by their national bulletins, with the aid of local publishers, extended invitations to each professor.
