

Red Cross 'Bank' Brings New Deal

A new plan of scheduling will be in effect when the Red Cross military blood mobile visits the Student Union from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. October 9 and 10. To eliminate long waiting lines and wasted time each prospective donor will receive a definite hour for his donation.

Anyone interested is asked by the Lane county Red Cross to call 4-5244. A card of confirmation will then be mailed.

Anyone who is between 18 and 60 may donate if he is in good health and weigh over 110 pounds. Those under 21 must have a signed release giving parental consent. Anyone who has served with the army in Korea or who has a history of jaundice or malaria cannot give at this drawing.

Sixty days must elapse between donation with a maximum of five per year allowed.

Ike to Speak Here Tuesday

Republican presidential nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower will be in Eugene for approximately 20 minutes Tuesday, according to Ed Boehnke, Lane county Republican central committee chairman.

Boehnke, who received confirmation of the already publicized stop Tuesday, said that Ike's train will come in to the Southern Pacific depot at 6:20 p.m. He said the ex-general's address "will be more than just a whistle-stop speech" and that Ike would not make another public appearance until he had reached California.

Accompanying the presidential candidate, Boehnke said, will be Governor and Mrs. Douglas McKay, Oregon congressmen Harris Ellsworth and Walter Norblad and state and local Republican leaders.

Draft Situation To Remain Same

The draft situation will be about the same this year as it was in 1951-52, according to Ray Hawk, Director of Men's Affairs. If the student's grades fall within the required limits for his class, he will be deferred, and two selective service deferment tests will be given this year on Dec. 4 and an unannounced date in April.

Students who have not taken this test are encouraged by Hawk to do so. The Selective Service boards often use the information given by the tests, in addition to class grades, as criteria for deferment. Hawk particularly emphasized that freshmen men, who have not yet had an opportunity to do so, take the test.

The De Paur Infantry chorus is scheduled for Dec. 8, Victoria de Los Angeles, soprano, on Feb. 4; the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo concert company, Feb. 13; James Melton, tenor, Mar. 2; the Portland Symphony orchestra with soloist as yet unannounced, April 6, tentatively; and Isaac Stern, violinist, April 17.

Students will be admitted to the concerts on their student body cards. Faculty members must have season tickets.
