Ike Strikes Hard On Midwest Swing

The Eisenhower campaign train is moving through Michigan and the Republican presidential candidate has appeared in seven cities in that state.

He stressed foreign policy, charging the administration with "frittering around and failures" in that field.

Big crowds turned out to greet the general. A police officer estimated up to 40,000 people saw the general as he toured by auto through the streets of Flint. And the crowd was estimated at 14,000 in Jackson.

Eisenhower said, "We're determined to pursue in the foreign field a comprehensive firm, broad policy that will truly lead toward peace."

In Jackson, Eisenhower said, "The old virtues of thrift and economy must be practiced. Unless we do that, we cannot preserve the kind of America necessary to bring us peace in the world. We cannot, must not, in time of peace and in time of prosperity, run into debt."

Earlier, Eisenhower charged the administration has claimed all the credit for foreign affairs success and has obscured the contributions of the Republican party in shaping decisions. He charged the Democrats attempted to shift the blame onto the Republicans when there were bad results.

The net effect, said the general, has been to endanger national unity. He told an audience in Flint, "I do not believe that bi-partisanship in foreign policy can survive such partisan treatment."

President Attacks Ike

President Harry S. Truman kept up his hard-hitting attack on General Eisenhower Wednesday as the president's campaign train went through Montana.

The president dedicated the 102 million dollar Hungry Horse dam, the world's third highest. He told his audience that if Eisenhower is elected, it will be a long time before they would see another similar structure. Truman accused the general of adopting the line of the private power monopoly.

The president quotes Eisenhower as saying of the Boulder Dam last June, "Here we have a perfect example of doing something for the people and doing it intelligently."

Truman says Eisenhower changed his mind in August in a speech accusing the government of being leftist. He quotes Eisenhower as saying, "The government will build dams, the government will tell you how to distribute your power . . . the government does everything but come and wash the dishes . . ."

Truman said at another address at Columbia Falls, "If you want to forego the privilege of these great assets and improvements, go ahead and vote the Republican ticket. You will get what you deserve and I won't sympathize with you."

Truman is to make a major address Wednesday night at Spokane, Washington.

Says GOP Plans 'Blitz'

The national head of the volunteers for Stevenson—George Ball—says the Republicans are planning what he terms a T-V and radio "blitz" campaign during the three weeks before the election. He says it will cost two million dollars and will be concentrated in 49 key counties in 12 states.

Says Ball, "The air will be thick with political soap suds and gooey with tasteless bubblegum."

He says the Republican campaign will not be the usual type. He states that it will be a "super-colossal, multi-million dollar production designed to sell an inadequate ticket to the people in precisely the way they sell soap, toothpaste, hair tonic or bubble gum."

Ball's remarks came at a rally in Springfield, Illinois, of volunteers for Stevenson workers from 29 states.

Governor Stevenson has an address scheduled Wednesday night to leaders of the volunteers for Stevenson organization in Springfield.

Newsmen threw a question at the Stevenson staff Wednesday—a demand for proof of the word put out Tuesday, that headquarters was getting a terrific response from the nominee's television speech Monday night. The staff has denied a report published by a Chicago newspaper (Daily News) that the response totaled only 340 telegrams. It is said to be checking for a more detailed reply.

Allied Planes Hit Enemy Troops

On the Korean battlefield, Chinese Communist troops raised brightly-colored pennants in celebration of the third anniversary of the Communist regime in China.

The fighting continues on the central front with Red troops fighting to the top of a disputed hill west of the Pukham River, but being forced back. East of the river, South Koreans were unsuccessful in trying to seize a hill position they lost to the Reds Monday.

Allied warplanes strafed enemy frontline positions and claim to have inflicted 55 casualties.

Meanwhile, the Fifth Air Force denies that its planes had bombed friendly Greek troops in western Korea Sunday. An announcement says an investigation showed "no bombs fell on the Greek troops." It has indicated it will have a statement later after making its own investigation.

Geography Professor Spends Vacation Studying Colorado Indians, Dwellings

Following the summer school session, J. C. Stovall, assistant professor of geography, spent four weeks studying first hand the geographic features of the Colorado plateau region.

Camping out, "in order to avoid the tourist camps and neon signs," Stovall studied the region around

Four Corners in Colorado. Four Corners, a dry corner of the plateau, is the only spot in the United States where four states meet at a common boundary.

The region also is where the Pueblo Indians had their cliff dwellings.

Stovall took three jeep rides into the back country of southeastern Utah. There, he commented, you could drive a hundred miles and see no one except an occasional Navajo Indian.

The Navajos are shepherders, living the primitive easy-going life of their fathers, Stovall reported.

weave blankets in the age-old and intricate patterns.

Goblin valley was another spot visited by Stovall and he remarked on the fantastic rock formations, towering like grim sentinels over the passersby. Monument valley in northeastern Arizona was another stopover on his tour and he also hiked down the Grand Canyon to Phantom Ranch.

Purpose of the trip, Stovall said, was to gather data for the geography department as well as for a vacation.
