Chance to Renew Season Tickets For University Theater Ends Friday

Friday is the deadline for all University theater season ticket renewals. Students who purchased tickets last year and wish to hold their priority numbers must place their orders by then.

With all 1952-53 season tickets which are renewals from last year, the University theater will give, at no cost, a guest ticket worth a full \$1 admission to any one of the 1952-53 major productions.

Each year a ticket holder renews his season ticket, he moves nearer the top of the priority list and gets even better seats by ordering in advance of general sales, according to Mrs. Gene Wiley, University theater business manager.

All season ticket holders, old and new, will receive advance notice of productions, and will be able to choose seats for the shows by mail. They will also be entitled to attend the two bonus attractions for the

1952-53 season.

The season ticket campaign in campus living organizations will also end Friday. All representatives will turn in their receipt books to the box office late Friday afternoon.

Puzzled over a maze of conflicting legal documents in a bankruptcy case, Lederle ordered the opposing lawyers to put down in simple, readable form just what the case was all about.

Then he hurled a judicial blast at the scribes of ancient times, blaming them for the redundant and dull legal papers of today.

"They were the only people who could read and write in their day," Lederle explained. "They were paid by the word instead of the day so instead of merely saying 'I give all my earthly belongings, etc.,' they said 'I hereby give, bequeath and bequest, ad infinitum.'"

\$10,000 Grant Aids Set Up of Institute

Notification of the approval by the state board of higher education of a \$10,000 grant to establish an Institute of Industrial Relations has been received by the economics department.

Subject to approval by the legislature, the grant will end Oregon's status as the only Pacific coast state without such an organization.

According to P. L. Kleinsorge, professor of economics, the main purpose of the Institute will be research in the field of industrial relations. Statistics thus compiled can then be compared with figures on industrial productivity and manpower availability in other coast states to form a more complete picture of western business.

The teaching of industrial relations will also form a part of the Institute's duties and information concerning legislation in the field will be released to the community as a public service, Kleinsorge added.

The Institute's program is not expected to get under way until sometime next year.
