

Van Leuven Run Saves Webfoots

MOSCOW, Ida.—Slipshod tackling, a porous defense and a wheezing ground game spelled almost certain defeat for the University of Oregon Webfoots here Saturday afternoon, but a pair of flash touchdowns late in the fourth quarter erased a seven-point University of Idaho lead and gave the Ducks a 20-14 decision.

A slim Homecoming crowd of 11,542 at Neale Stadium nearly rioted in the closing stages after a number of crucial decisions went against the Vandals. Breaks decided the outcome, since the statistics show Idaho unmistakably far ahead in rushing, first downs, and in the percentage of passes completed.

Two questionable interference

calls against Idaho defenders, a possible intentional grounding by Quarterback Holland late in the third quarter, and a mixup on Monte Brethauer's offside kick following the Ducks' tying touchdown drew the ire of the Idaho partisans. Bob Holder, Vandal captain, claimed that the ball didn't go the necessary 10 yards.

The win was Oregon's first of the 1952 season and moves the Ducks into a fourth place tie with the University of Washington in the Pacific Coast conference standings. The Vandals dropped into a basement deadlock with the Washington State college Cougars.

The Draw Play

By far the biggest break of the game was the split in the Vandal line which launched Dean Van

Leuven's 59 yard sprint for the winning touchdown, just 3:50 before the final gun. Van Leuven, on a trap (similar to the one that produced Bob Ashworth's run for the money against Oregon State last year), broke through the middle, swerved to his right and was in the clear at the 25.

Shortly before this bit of drama, Tom Lyon, a defensive back, blocked Quarterback Wayne Anderson's punt from the 15. Starting on the five, the six-foot, 197 sophomore full back — Van Leuven — hit the center of the Vandal line for half the distance and Farrell Albright picked up a bare half-yard.

Hal Dunham passed incomplete, but the black and white shirted-officials detected interference on

the one. Dunham barged into the end zone with 4:05 left on the time piece. Emerson Harvey, hero of Oregon's 14-13 win over Idaho last year at Eugene, booted the extra point which deadlocked the contest.

And It's Good

Coach Len Casanova, who was fully prepared for a close affair, called on Brethauer for an onside attempt. Brethauer, equal to the occasion, angled the pigskin to his right where Right Guard Jim Jacques picked it up on the Idaho 47. Dunham, looking for a receiver, was swarmed over on the Duck 41 for a 14-yard setback. Idaho was looking for the passer when Van Leuven took over—and took off. Not a Vandal came near him and Oregon had its winning

touchdown after a brief, 60-second pause.

The Vandals were clearly the better team for the most part. They stymied the Webfoots' running game and put on an effective ground attack of their own. Anderson, an all-around field general, passed often enough and well enough to keep the Ducks guessing. Oregon's tackling was miserable. The Webfoots took three and four swipes at the Idaho runners.

Anderson, Fullback Bob Lee and Right Halfback Larry Hart bore the brunt of Idaho's 73 yard drive which resulted in a touchdown three minutes before the end of the first quarter. A 26 yard pass from Anderson to Roger Randolph, and a basketball toss from An-

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BUMS NAME BLACK

Yanks Win 3-2, Deadlock Series; Casey Hedges on Starting Pitcher

BROOKLYN, NY (AP)—They're all even with only one more to play. The Brooklyn Dodgers will send out Rookie Joe Black to do their pitching in the final game of the 1952 World Series today. New York Yankee Manager Casey Stengel may pull a surprise and name Tom Gorman to start for the defending champions.

Stengel insisted Monday that he didn't know who the Yankee pitcher would be until he had slept on it. However, the hottest rumor connected with the series is that the bespectacled Gorman will toe the hill against Brooklyn. He won six and lost two this season.

Allie (Big Chief) Reynolds, who has won in three games already, asdi he will be ready, although admitting that he wouldn't be at his best. Black, the Brooklyn rookie, won the opener, 4-2 but lost the fourth game, 2-0.

The Yanks, who tied the series Monday with a 3-2 win, for the first time during the classic, are not favored. It's an even-money game with the Broadway book-makers, those who are operating, quoting 6 to 5 and take your choice.

One of the Best

Unless today's game develops into a rout, the 1952 series will go down in history as one of the most pulsating of them all.

Only the second game, a 7-1 Yankee victory in which Vic Raschi fired a three-hitter, didn't go down to the final out in suspense. The rest were nail-biters from the first to the last.

Monday's game was no exception. The Yanks' winning margin was supplied by Mickey Mantle's eight-inning homer, but that seemed only an anti-climax.

Duke Snider, who has cloaked himself with a mantle of greatness in the series, broke up a scoreless deadlock with a homer in the sixth off Raschi. But the Yankees drew ahead in the seventh after Dodger Starter Billy Loes had set them down with two hits for six innings. Yogi Berra, the goat of the third game, tied the score with a homer. A single by Gene Woodling, a balk by Loes and one of Raschi's infrequent hits put New York ahead. Raschi's hit caromed off Loes' knee into right field. Had the ball been fielded, it would have been the third out.

Mickey Does It

Then Mantle blasted a homer in the eighth—his first in world series competition. That made it 3-1. But the Dodgers weren't through.

Snider came up in the last of the eighth and belted his fourth homer of the series, an accomplishment only the great Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig had done before. George (Shotgun) Shuba

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Brooks Silent; Yanks Jubilant After Third Win

BROOKLYN, NY (AP)—The New York Yankees were as happy as kids with a pass to a candy factory as they whooped things up in their dressing room after Monday's World Series game.

The Yanks, who won 3-2, had to call on their ace, Allie Reynolds, in relief and there is doubt as to whether he will start today's final game. Allie pitched one and one-third innings.

Case Doesn't Know

Manager Casey Stengel said: "I honestly don't know who I'll use. I'm not trying to be mysterious. But I don't know." Reynolds said simply: "I can always pitch."

The Brooklyn dressing room was quiet after the Dodgers filed in after their defeat in the sixth game of the series. The only sound that could be heard was 22-year-old Billy Loes mumbling to himself. Loes dished up homers to Yogi Berra in the seventh and Mickey Mantle in the eighth. But the young right-hander seemed more concerned about the balk he had made in the seventh.

After Berra homered, Gene Woodling singled and with one out, Irv Noren stepped up to hit. Loes wound up—then, all of a sudden, the ball squirted from his hands. The umpire called it a balk—the first of the series—and Woodling took second. With out two, Vic Raschi caromed a hard shot off Loes that bounced all the way into right field, scoring Woodling.

No Grip

Loes said he was trying to grip the ball for a curve when it got away from him.

Duke Snider, a hero all the way for Brooklyn, belted his fourth homer of the series in the eighth. He said he was surprised that he had tied Ruth and Gehrig by hitting four round trippers in one series.

Fresh from a victory over Idaho's Vandals, the Webfoots were hard at work preparing for next Saturday's clash with California's high riding Golden Bears.

Under the watchful eye of backfield Coach Johnny McKay, the Duck backs went through a snappy passing session with the three-quarterbacks, Hal Dunham, George Shaw and Barney (Joe Black) Holland hitting their targets with precision-like accuracy. On the receiving end of the aeriels were backs Farrell Albright, Ted Anderson, Manning and Merritt Barber, Don Sloan, Lloyd Powell, Tom Novikoff and Dean Van Leuven.

The Oregon running game received a severe setback when it was learned through x-rays that big Tom Elliott's right ankle bone was fractured. Elliott will surely be lost to the Ducks when Oregon meets the Bears.

Dick Stout, 220 pound center, who suffered a broken ankle in pre-season practice, returned to the practice field, but only to loosen up his leg. Pat O'Brien, also injured in pre-season workouts, saw restricted duty as an offensive tackle.

Ted Anderson, who failed to make the Idaho trip because of an injured knee, saw service in his halfback slot but was still slowed down by his injury. Bob Wilcox, who has been plagued by a re-occurring knee injury was back in uniform after a short layoff.
