George On The Run
A spectacular, combination pass and run from Dunham to George Shaw on the last play of the first period covered 52 yards from the Oregon 20 to the Idaho 28. Shaw caught the spiral on the Vandal 40. Dunham was driven to cover on the 34, but Novikoff bounced back with an 11 yard gain and Dunham fired to Wayne Johnson on the 10 for a first and ten.

Shaw tested right end for three yards and on the following play dashed down the left sidelines and into the end zone where he caught Dunham's pitch for a score. Harvey's kick was good.

Hart fumbled the kickoff on the Vandal 11, but the Webfoots could not cash in. A fourth down field goal attempt by Harvey from the Idaho 24 misfired. The boot was short and wide to the right; Flip Kleffner, Idaho fullback, scooped up the ball in the end-zone and was out to the 15 before the Ducks realized that it was legal. Kleffner was finally pulled down on the Oregon 39.

Petruzzi Scores
A clipping penalty slowed down the Idahoans but Jim Petruzzi, on third down and two yards to go for a touchdown, glanced off left tackle to score standing up. Buhler converted with 7:55 left to give Idaho a 14-7 edge.

Babe Curfman's gold and silver-rigged eleven actually put over a touchdown shortly before the intermission. Anderson passed from 18 yards out to Buhler who went over from the five, but the Vandals were declared offside.

Wisconsin Leads AP Football Poll

NEW YORK (AP)—University of Wisconsin has taken over first place in the latest Associated Press football poll. Conquerors of Illinois last Saturday and the number one favorite to win the Big Ten championship and a trip to the Rose Bowl, the Badgers wrested first place from Michigan State.

Wisconsin piled up 27 of a possible 138 first place votes while Michigan State polled 24. Third place California claimed 23 and fourth place Maryland garnered 22. Cal and Maryland exchanged places in the national standings.

Michigan State, which shaded Oregon State by a field goal in the final two seconds, dropped to second place, a spot held by Illinois last week. The Illini dropped down to thirteenth place. Following California and Maryland came Georgia Tech, Duke, Southern California, Notre Dame, Kansas and Princeton. Texas, which was beaten by Notre Dame in an upset, was the other team to drop from the select circle.

The second ten in order are: UCLA, Oklahoma, Illinois, Villanova, Virginia, Purdue, Navy, Alabama, Georgia and Penn State.
