Book reviews and lectures by members of the faculty will again be held this year on Wednesday evenings in the Student Union browsing room under sponsorship of the University of Oregon library, house librarians and browsing room committee.

Subjects and speakers featured on the fall term schedule are of varied school and departmental interest.

Slides Featured For Schmitt Talk

Slides on the broadside history of Oregon will be shown at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Student Union browsing room. Martin Schmitt, curator of special collections at the University library, will accompany the presentation with a lecture on "Noble Fragments".

Schmitt has spent much time tracking down and investigating photographic collections in the Northwest. In 1946 he edited and published the autobiography of Gen. George Crook and in 1948 he collaborated with Dee Brown in writing "Fighting Indians of the West" and "Trail Driving Days." He is a graduate of the University of Illinois School of Journalism.

Following the lecture, E. S. Pomeroy, associate professor of history will lead the discussion period.

The Marx act underwent many changes with Chico and Gummo finally joining Groucho and Harpo to become the "Four Marx Brothers." During World War I Harpo and Gummo went into the army and Chico and Groucho toured army camps. After the war, Gummo left the act and Zeppo took his place. In 1922 the Marx Brothers clicked with a musical entitled "I'll Say She Is." The show was a smash hit both in Chicago and in New York.

There followed the big Marx success "The Cocoanuts" in 1926 and "Animal Crackers" in 1928. Both were later made into movies. Their other film successes included "Monkey Business," "Horsefeathers," "Duck Soup" and "A Night at the Opera."

Featured by Time magazine on its cover some months ago, Groucho was described as follows: "To some Americans, the name Marx summons up a bearded prophet of social doom, but to most it means a zany tumble of brothers. Groucho is the zaniest and most durable of the lot. In his long career as a comedian, he has met and mastered three mediums: movies, radio and now television."

Has Made Himself

Having had little formal education, Groucho has made himself a well-educated man through heavy reading during his leisure hours. It is reported that he constantly surprises his friends by discussing articles from such magazines as "Atlantic," "Harpers" and others of this class. One of his favorite pastimes is sitting for long hours in his den strumming Gilbert and Sullivan on his guitar. He is an expert on these as well as on the novels of Henry James.

New Library Displays Feature Bibles, French Gift Collection

Bible editions ranging from a facsimile of the Gutenberg Bible, published in 1456, which was the first book ever printed in the West, to the new modern Bible edition published in 1952, nearly 500 years later, and Bible manuscripts of the middle ages are on display in the library now in connection with the appearance of the new English translation of the Bible.

Facsimiles of the Greek bible manuscripts of the fourth century and the Hebrew Scroll of Esther are included as well as a Bible manuscript of the thirteenth century written in miniature letters and with rich illustrations. Incunabula Bibles printed in the fifteenth century form another part of the display.

Various English translations,

from the early sixteenth century to the present are represented, including an early edition of the King James version, a mid-sixteenth century multi-lingual Bible and the revised standard version which was officially released on September 30.

Another collection of books on display in the library this week is a gift of 15 volumes made to the University by the La Bonne Volonte Franco-Americaine, an organization promoting Franco-American cultural relations. The books were presented to the University in recognition of having one of the ten most outstanding French divisions in the United States.

The collection presents a cross section of the French literature and arts. Included is Alexis de Tocqueville's well-known treatise de la Democratie en Amerique, dedicated to the University by the present Comte de Tocqueville, the "Ezra" of General de Chambrun, signed by the author, works of Diderot, Henri Marchand, a volume of reproductions of the famous painter David and others.

Korean G.I. Bill Material Ready

All veterans on campus should contact the Veteran's administration in Emerald hall to pick up newly arrived information and forms on the Korean G.I. bill of rights. Veterans will be required to carry at least 14 hours to be eligible.

Students desiring to study under the provisions of the bill should file an application with their local veteran's administration office. They will then be sent eligibility certificates, which are to be presented in the registrar's office in Emerald hall. No aid can be given to a student unless this certificate is filed.

A form must also be filed by the tenth of each month declaring the number of dependents and a certification by the University.

Replacing L. W. Staples during his sabbatical leave, Griffin has served on the University of Alaska staff and the research staff of the University of California. He is now carrying on the experiments of Staples' concerning x-ray crystallographic materials.
