

Grizzled Stengel Leads Celebration; Will Not Retire

NEW YORK (AP)—Manager Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees took charge of the hilarious celebration in the dressing room after his team won its fourth straight world championship Tuesday.

He roared repeatedly, "we can always win on the road." Stengel was referring to the fact that the Yankees won three out of their four World Series triumphs in Ebbets field, home park of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Stengel pointed to Bob Kuzava and Mickey Mantle as the heroes of Tuesday's game. But he was interrupted at that point by someone who asked if Casey planned to retire now that he has won four straight World Series. Stengel roared out his answer. "No," he said, "I'm not even thinking of quitting."

FOURTH IN A ROW

Southpaw Cools Dodger Uprising; Mantle Collects Winning Drives

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Yankee steam-roller moved Tuesday to its fourth straight World Series crown and its 15th since 1923.

The irrepressible New Yorkers mowed down the Brooklyn Dodgers, 4 to 2, in the seventh and deciding contest before 33,195 fans at Ebbets field.

There were many heroes in the New York camp and many futile figures on the Brooklyn side.

Slugging Mantle

Mickey Mantle, who will be 21 years old in two weeks, was the batting star. He clubbed his second homer in two days to give the Yankees a 3 to 2 edge in the sixth. Then, in the seventh inning, the young outfielder from the oil fields of Oklahoma blasted a single to give the Yankees a 4 to 2 margin.

Bob Kuzava was another hero. The onetime Washington pitcher entered the game in the seventh inning after Ed Lopat, Allie Reynolds and Vic Raschi had faltered. And Kuzava's southpaw slants stopped the Dodgers cold, although not without some anxious moments.

As early as the fourth inning, the Dodgers had a chance to move well out in front. They went into the inning trailing 1 to 0.

This was because Phil Rizzuto's double and Johnny Mize's single had pushed across a marker in the top of the inning.

Only One Run

Brooklyn quickly loaded the sacks on Duke Snider's single and a pair of bunts by Jackie Robinson and Roy Campanella. That finished southpaw Eddie Lopat. However, the best the Dodgers got out of the inning was one run. This was tallied when Gil Hodges flied deep to left, after Reynolds relieved Lopat. Then, George Shuba and Carl Furillo made outs and Reynolds was out of trouble.

The Yankees took a 2 to 1 lead in the fifth when Gene Woodling homered. The Dodgers came back to even the count on a double by Cox and Reese's single.

A Distorted View

Brooklyn, NY (AP)—A big guy was shown to his seat far down the left field line at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, Tuesday for the seventh game of the World Series.

He no sooner was seated than he began bellowing: "I'll kill that Bellhop. He sold me this seat and said it was behind the catcher."

A little fellow from Brooklyn tapped the big man on the shoulder and said: "Friend, you are behind the catcher—the bull-pen catcher."

Once again, the Yankees took the lead when Mantle homered off starter Joe Black in the sixth.

Raschi entered the game in the seventh and walked Furillo. He retired pinch-hitter Rocky Nelson. Cox singled and Reese walked to fill the bases.

Kuzava Cools 'Em

That was all for Raschi. Kuzava took over and completely dominated the scene. It will be recalled that he entered last year's World Series game in the ninth inning when the New York Giants threatened and retired the side. He did practically the same thing Tuesday. He got Snider on an automatic infield out and Robinson also popped out.

In the eighth, the Dodgers put on a mild threat when McDougald made a wild throw on a grounder by Hodges. Incidentally, he went hitless again today and finished the seven-game series without a hit—a new record. But Kuzava went on serenely and got pinch-hitter Andy Pafko and Furillo to end the eighth.

In the ninth, the Dodgers went down meekly and the Yankees rushed out on the field to maul and haul Kuzava. He had pitched two and two-third hitless innings to preserve Reynolds' sixth World Series victory.

BROOKLYN (AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers agreed they would rather have been beaten 10 to 0, than by the 4-2 score with which the New York Yankees won the final game of the World Series.

Manager Charley Dressen said the Dodgers figured to get back in the ball game until the final out. Said the Brooklyn skipper,

"We felt every minute we would get back in the ball game. But our big men didn't have the punch when we needed it. We knew we could get to Reynolds and Raschi if they stayed in. But that Kuzava was burning his fast ball in there."

Webfoot Guns Bombard Frosh

Preparing for their third Pacific Coast Conference encounter of the season against the California Golden Bears in Portland, the Webfoot varsity underwent a tough knock-down drag out scrimmage against the freshman squad. George Shaw was the star of the passing act as he hit the air lanes with pin point passes to receivers Merritt Barber, Monte Brethauer, Ferrell Albright, Lloyd Powell, Don Sloan, Tom Novikoff and Jim Jones for sizable gains.

The scrimmage, approximately one hour in length, gave the Ducks the kind of contact work they received before last year's California game which the Bears won on conversions 28-26. The Ducks will miss Charley Laird, dependable line-backer who starred against UCLA. Laird suffered a severe leg injury in the Idaho game.

In the running game Tom Novikoff and Merritt Barber stood out. Novikoff repeatedly punched the line for sizeable gains as did Barber.

Ted Anderson, halfback, saw no rough work as he is still nursing a sore ankle. Dean Van Lueven, who played his best game to date against Idaho, found it tough going as he is still being bothered by a game injury. Len Berrie, left tackle, saw full duty on offense as the other injured players' activities were confined to limbering-up exercises. The practice session was closed out by conditioning sprints. More scrimmages are expected this week prior to the game.

Husky Ticket Sale Expires Tuesday

Athletic Business Manager Howard Lemons warned students who plan to attend the University of Oregon-University of Washington football game Oct. 18 in Seattle that the deadline for purchasing tickets is next Tuesday.

The ducats, priced at \$1.75 each, are 50-yard seats in the lower section of the flying wing, directly behind the Oregon bench. Washington has allocated the Webfoots nearly 900 tickets, but those unsold must be returned to Seattle to be put on public sale.

Lemons also made it clear that the only block of seats available to Oregon students for the Oregon State game Nov. 22 will be removed from sale at McArthur court Nov. 7. Tickets are priced at \$2.50 and are situated from the 30 to the 50 yard line on the East side of Multnomah stadium.
