

Schmitt to Show Old Handbills, Reveal Parts of Oregon History

There's a history of Oregon aside from that which you find in the history books. It lies in the countless number of handbills that have been issued in Oregon cities in past years.

Martin F. Schmitt, curator of special collections at the University library, has come across scores of these handbills, or "broad-sides" as they are called, which

tell a lively history of Oregon.

Schmitt has had slides made of the handbills and will show them in the Student Union browsing room at 7:30 p.m. tonight.

They tell a continuous story of Oregon in politics, education, business, and amusements since the year 1846. They also form a composite picture of the history of printing in the state.

"In those days they got away with things that today would have been libelous," Schmitt reports. Many of the handbills were printed as a result of anger and high indignation, he said.

He has gathered many stories from old letters, diaries, and reminiscences while tracing the history of the handbills, which he will recount, tonight.

Schmitt is a graduate of the University of Illinois school of journalism. He has edited, in collaboration with Dee Brown, two pictorial histories of the old West, "Trail Driving Days" and "Fighting Indians of the West."

The broadsides are part of the University Library's Oregon collection.

TeststobeGiven Men on Draft ExemptionBasis

This year's selective service college qualification tests will be given on campus Dec. 4 and April 23. To date, 413,395 students have taken the test, and this number is expected to swell to 500,000 after this year's tests.

Students wishing to take the test may pick up applications at draft boards. They are advised to do so as quickly as possible, regardless of which test they wish to take.

Freshmen are advised to wait until the April test so that they may have two terms of college experience behind them, according to Ray Hawk, director of men's affairs.

To be eligible for a deferment on the basis of the test, a student must intend to request deferment as a student, be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction and must not previously have taken the test.

The deadline for applications for the Dec. 4 test is midnight, Nov. 1. To be eligible for deferment, a student must achieve a score of 70 on the test, or be in a specified rank in his class. These ranks are: upper half of the male freshman class, upper two thirds of the male sophomores or upper three fourths of the male juniors. Graduate students are deferred if their work is satisfactory. Local boards, however, are not forced to follow these criteria.

When applying to the nearest board for the application, the student will be given a bulletin of information. Following instructions in this bulletin, the student should fill out his application and mail it immediately in the envelope provided.

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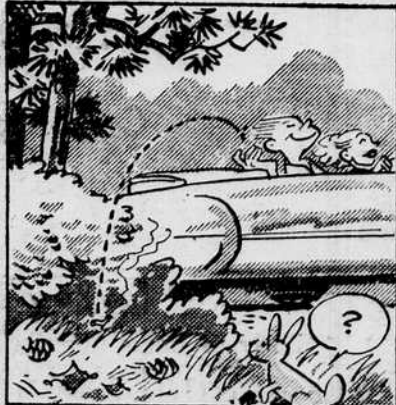
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
