Lewis Blasts Taft; Group Approves

(AP)—United Mine Workers leader John L. Lewis, who has been supporting Republican candidates in presidential elections, shows signs of switching. Addressing his union's convention in Cincinnati, Lewis has blasted Senator Robert Taft, calling him an "enemy of the people" and the "articulate zombie of predatory and oppressive wealth."

In an obvious reference to Eisenhower, Lewis said "it is beyond human comprehension that an American with a child to rear and a wife to protect should ever deign to support him ... or any other man whom Taft may lead around by the collar."

Lewis did not mention Eisenhower by name in his address. As Lewis spoke nearly 3,000 convention delegates roared their approval.

Ohio Senator Blasts Truman

(AP)—Senator Robert Taft climaxed a day of campaigning in Illinois by describing President Truman as a man "whose whole standard of morality is pretty low."

The Ohio Republican made the remark in a speech prepared for delivery at Zion, Illinois, some 45 miles north of Chicago. Taft is campaigning for General Eisenhower. The Senator said Eisenhower's Democratic opponent could not clean house in Washington because, as Taft put it, Governor Stevenson would be a "prisoner" of the Truman administration.

In an earlier talk, Taft gave a description of his own meeting with Eisenhower in New York last month. This is the meeting that brought Democratic charges that Taft was "calling the tune" in Eisenhower's campaign. The Senator said the New York meeting was a move to dispel any fears that General Eisenhower might have new deal leanings.

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sade" had as its first purpose the unseating of the "shop-worn" administration in Washington. "Let us have decency and honesty in government" Ike declared. As a clarion call for decency, it sounded rather hollow coming from one whose latest political "bed-fellow" is Joe McCarthy.

Eisenhower could have touched on any one of several issues in Eugene—a city vitally concerned with conservation of natural resources, water power, lumbering and education. Yet, as he has done repeatedly throughout the campaign, the general's speech was devoid of any real attention to these problems.

His appeal was to emotion ("I led your sons to victory") rather than to reason. He proved himself to be a likeable man with an engaging smile. Yet there was nothing in his speech which would lead a discriminating citizen to believe that the general would make a great president.

If last night's speech had been offered to the people of Eugene by anyone but the hero of 1944-45, they would have felt that they had heard a typical, uninformative harangue by a small-time politician, adept in dodging issues rather than in meeting them squarely.
