White Horse Held After 'Free-for-All'

South Koreans held their own on White Horse mountain after winning, losing and relosing the strategic hill Thursday. After repeated Chinese counter-attacks, the South Koreans seized the shell-blistered hill 50 miles north of Seoul early Friday morning, Korean time.

One officer described the fighting on the crest of the hill as a free-for-all with bayonets, grenades and fists.

Action slackened elsewhere along the front except for a new outbreak of dog-fights in the air. American sabre-jets knocked out two Migs and damaged three others in Northwestern action along the front.

Death Toll 99 In British Wreck

The death toll Thursday stood at 99 after Britain's worst train disaster in 37 years.

Rescue workers at Harrow lifted off another layer of the wreckage Thursday night and uncovered five bodies. Ninety-four persons are still in hospitals.

A British railway official told newsmen that the job of searching the ruins was nearly completed, but the cause of the triple-train wreck has not yet been determined.

B-29, Jet Crash Near Portland

The Air Force announced Thursday that a mid-air collision with a jet-fighter caused a B-29 bomber to crash Thursday near Wilsonville, 18 miles from Portland.

Air force spokesmen said that all 11 men aboard the B-29 died in the crash. The pilot of the jet fighter managed to take his plane back to McChord field near Tacoma. The bomber was on a routine flight from Travis base in California.

A preliminary report from an investigating party at the crash scene indicated the jet and the B-29 collided while the two planes were in joint training.

Air force officials said that the precise details and cause of the collision will not be known until an exhaustive investigation is made.

Crowd of 700,000 Greets Ike in LA

Crowds estimated at between 700,000 and 1,000,000 greeted Republican Presidential Nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower in Los Angeles Thursday. Eisenhower told Los Angeles citizens in a major evening address that he was firmly opposed to socialized medicine, but plans for using government loans to bolster local health insurance programs should be thoroughly examined.

In a survey of the whole field of social security legislation he said, "Our doctors will be among the first to admit that at present too many of our people live too far from adequate medical aid, and too many of our people find the costs of adequate medical care too heavy."

He also urged that the strength of voluntary action and community administration must be preserved.

disputes involving the accuracy of an official's decision or actions, the conference makes a detailed examination of the case. But after the original excitement had died down the incident is usually forgotten. Such was the Frank Gifford case last year, where photographs "proved" that he was over the line of scrimmage when he tossed a pass against Oregon State. USC defeated the Beavers, 16-14.

At that time it was suggested that disputed games of this type be ruled "no contest," but the conference decided that this policy was not sound because the loser might make a habit of protesting every game.

Hollis said that he "doesn't know of any other conference which has a better program for selecting officials. They are watched over by Frank McCormick, supervisor of officials, they are checked over by outsiders, and every football coach in the conference plays a real part in selecting them."

"They are assigned with the greatest of care; it is not the policy of the conference to assign poor officials. In fact, we don't have any poor officials," Hollis emphasized.

Head Football Coach Len Casanova had little to say except to point out that the University of Michigan lost to Stanford because of an interference penalty. Michigan didn't complain or cry about it. Backfield Coach John McKay stated that he was positive the officials were justified in calling the interference plays on the Vandals. Athletic Director Leo Harris refused comment on the subject until the commissioner's office had reviewed the case.

would be doing the former three a favor "if you saw to it that they were NEVER assigned to officiate here at the University again."

Cox admitted that "it doesn't usually sound good for a loser to blame his loss on anything but a stronger opponent." But he pointed out that "when things get so bad it becomes impossible to tell who won and who lost, then we feel we are duty bound to comment publicly on the situation." "Good Conscience," he said, "demands that this game be declared 'no contest' and the two teams should have an opportunity this year to play a football game, as they were scheduled to do."

OSC Last Year
A situation somewhat similar to this one occurred in PCC play last fall when Oregon State college protested a 16-14 loss to the University of Southern California. Films of the game appeared to show that Frank Gifford, USC back then, was across the scrimmage line when he threw the winning touchdown pass. The game, however, stayed in the records as it had been played despite the OSC pleas.
